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MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS Tuesday, May 21, 2013

I. CALL TO ORDER

There being a quorum, the regular meeting of the Board of Directors was called to order at 11:50 a.m., Tuesday, May 21, 2013. Present at the meeting were:

Daniel Tydingco, Chairman Christine Baleto, Vice Chairperson Shelly Gibson, Board Secretary Joanne M.S. Brown, General Manager Felix R. Pangelinan, Interim Deputy General Manager Atty. Mike Phillips, Legal Counsel

Also present were Phillips & Bordallo law office-John Bell; Cementon Micronesia-John Perez, Esther Rebadulla; Perez Bros-Frank Perez, Gregory Perez, Tricee Limtiaco; Office of Senator Tom Ada-Jimmy Camacho; Pacific Daily News-Mark Pieper; Marianas Variety-Joy White; KUAM-Ken Quintanilla; Pacific News Center-Kevin Karrigan and Port Management staff.

Board Tenure Expiry: Before proceeding with the items on the agenda, the Chairman announced that directors Eduardo Ilao and Michael Benito have officially expired their term as members of the Port Authority Board of Directors. He mentioned that although Mr. Ilao has been reappointed by Governor Eddie Calvo, his reappointment is pending legislative confirmation. As to Mr. Benito, he will be focusing on his primary business obligation. The Chairman asked that a resolution be prepared expressing gratitude and appreciation of Mr. Benito's service to the Port Authority Board of Directors.

II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

a. <u>April 30, 2013</u>: The Vice Chairperson made motion to approve the minutes of April 30, 2013 subject to correction, seconded by Ms. Gibson and was unanimously passed.

III. PUBLIC COMMENT

- a. **Public Comment:** None.
- b. **Employee Comment:** None.

c. <u>PAGGMA Association</u>: Mr. John B. Santos, PAGGMA President said the Port has raised \$1,500.00 for the Relay for Life. A fundraiser for this cause is being hosted by PAGGMA association on May 23, 2013 and the Candle Light Ceremony is held on May 24th in the evening.

IV. GENERAL MANAGERS REPORT

A report was presented by the General Manager for Board's information. Following key items of the report are as follows:

- 1. Workers Compensation Insurance: As directed at the previous meeting, management sent a letter to the Chief Procurement Officer of the General Services Agency (GSA) requesting that Bid No. GSA/PAG-004-13 on the workers compensation insurance be cancelled due to the significant cost provided by a lone bidder. Cancellation of this bid will also provide an opportunity for other insurance companies to compete at a more affordable price. Management along with legal counsel will work on a revised bid specification. The Chairman advised that the revised specifications be completed by next week to begin the bid re-issuance with GSA. The General Manager also added that the Port will continue to work with the Port Oversight Chair in amending the existing law specific to Section 10111(e) of Chapter 10, Title 12, GCA that will allow the Port to self-insure for workers compensation.
- 2. <u>Environmental Protection Plan</u>: In relation to the Port Modernization Program, the final environmental protection plan was submitted to Guam Environmental Protection Agency on April 24, 2013 for approval. This is essential for construction to commence and to provide contractors with proper guidance to address the handling and disposal of contaminated materials.
- 3. <u>USDA \$2M CF Direct Loan</u>: Management met with USDA on May 8, 2013 regarding the use of the \$2M CF direct loan. The initial application for this loan was to purchase a new gantry crane, and was advised by USDA that reprogram of the funds can be considered with justification. The Port has until June 13, 2013 to respond to USDA.
- 4. Public Notice on Port Interim Tariff Rate: The Port advertised a general public notice on the 5.65% proposed rate adjustment which is intended to generate adequate revenues to cover the increase in operating costs as well as to service the loan incidental to fund the service life extension of the primary operational wharves F4-F6, cargo handling equipment acquisition and upgrade of the financial management system. After the sixty day notice period and outreach, the Port will file a petition on its proposed interim rates with the Public Utilities Commission that will then schedule the public hearings accordingly.
- 5. Port Procurement Delegation of Authority: In order for the Port to eventually absorb the operations and maintenance of the cranes and facilitate procurement to address the need to procure equipment and needed parts and materials, steps must be taken for the Port to reassume its procurement authority, perhaps through legislation. The Chairman understands the predicament the Port is faced with in acquiring its necessary supplies and materials; however, advised management to first exhaust all administrative efforts in obtaining procurement delegation through the GSA prior to seeking legislative assistance.

- 6. <u>Divisional Reports</u>: The respective divisional reports for the month of May 2013 are provided for Board's information.
 - **Finance Report**. The Vice Chairperson asked that the crane surcharge be provided as a separate report identifying its revenues and expenditures. Ms. Gibson asked management to prepare the financial impact of the 3.95% interim tariff since its implementation.
 - Performance Management Contract for Cranes (PMC). The Chairman asked the status of the cost negotiations. Mrs. Alma B. Javier, Procurement Manager mentioned that cost negotiation with the offeror is nearing completion. The Chairman advised legal counsel to review the procurement process of this proposal.

Additional reporting items were made as follows:

- 7. Annual Report / Citizen Centric Report: These reports will be prepared covering fiscal years 2011 and 2012 for the annual report, and fiscal year 2012 for the citizen centric report.
- 8. <u>Fiscal Year 2014 Budget</u>: Management will begin to commence working sessions and discussions with division heads on their respective budget for fiscal year 2014.
 - 9. <u>Merit Bonus</u>: Still in the process of gathering information.
 - 10. <u>Hotel Wharf</u>: A revitalization plan was provided for Board's information.
- 11. <u>Agat Marina</u>: The Vice Chairperson asked management to provide a plan to upgrade the Agat marina facilities.
- 12. <u>Office of Economic Adjustment</u>: Ms. Gibson asked that management begin to conduct federal outreach on grant support with Mr. Gary Kuwabara. The Chairman mentioned that courtesy calls should also be made to the newly appointed Maritime Administrator and other federal partners.

V. OLD BUSINESS

a. <u>Cementon Micronesia</u>: At this time, the members recognized the presence of Mr. John Perez, Cementon Micronesia. Mr. Perez thanked the members and said the Board had recently approved Resolution No. 2013-04 regarding the Port Board's endorsement of Mobil-Cementon-PAG agreements and allowing Cementon to complete construction and commence operations. As a result of the resolution, Mr. Perez mentioned that a request was made to Mobil to proceed with the negotiations on the agreement; however, Mobil responded reiterating prior concerns specific to requirements of U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and United States Coast Guard (USCG). Mr. Perez expressed that Mobil's response was concerning and requested for Port Board and management to consider initiating negotiations for a performance agreement on Gulf pier specific to a transfer of cement and cementitious products onto Cementon's terminal. The Chairman said a meeting was held with Mobil Country Manager this morning concerning the issues contained in their response letter to Cementon. It is the Port's

understanding that Mobil is not necessarily attempting to make unreasonable demands for all parties to move forward on the co-use of the pier; but rather to ascertain whether or not Cementon has engaged with federal regulatory entities, such as with USCG, and U.S. Army Corp of Engineers (USACOE). Mr. Perez responded that Cementon has fulfilled those requirements as it has a permit to build the facility, possess an USACOE permit, submitted a facilities security plan to USCG. He expressed that he does not understand what other concerns there are. After discussion, management was advised to arrange a meeting with Cementon Micronesia and Mobil relative to Cementon's access to and use of Gulf pier for purposes of construction/installation of cement transfer pipeline. As result of these events, Mr. Perez requested once again for a deferral in rent of the Port leased area as it expires in June 2013. There were no objections.

RECESSED

At this time, the members agreed to take a break. The meeting recessed at 1:00 p.m.

RECONVENED

The members reconvened the meeting at 1:25 p.m.

- b. <u>KM&T</u>: Mr. Glenn B. Nelson, Commercial Manager said KM&T submitted a letter to the Port requesting to conduct environmental studies; however, this authorization was approved by the Port back in July 2011 for KM&T to proceed.
- c. <u>GEDA Loan Status</u>: The General Manager said the Port Oversight Chair made some inquiry to GEDA on the amended bill concerning sovereign immunity. A follow-up with GEDA will be made as to the status.
- d. <u>Port Modernization Program-Implementation Plan</u>: The General Manager said the port modernization program is on track and the Technical Development Team meets on a weekly basis.
- e. <u>Workers Compensation Insurance</u>: (Item addressed under General Manager's report.)
- f. MOU with Revenue & Taxation: The Chairman asked whether legislation is required to grant the Port Authority to garnish tax refunds of individuals and companies that have a debt owed to the Port. Ms. Gibson understands that the Port is eligible and will provide the Board with the authority that allows this arrangement to be made with Revenue & Taxation.
 - g. <u>Tariff Adjustment and PUC</u>: (Item addressed under General Manager's report.)

Without objections, the members addressed the following items under new business.

VI. NEW BUSINESS

- a. <u>Travel / Training Plan</u>: Ms. Gibson expressed that for quite some time she had requested for a travel and training plan for the year. Mr. Felix R. Pangelinan, Interim Deputy General Manager apologized and mentioned that a plan should be provided by the next Board meeting. Mr. Pangelinan informed the Board that the front office expressed concerns on the amount of port participants traveling at the same time for training. The Chairman appreciates the front office's concerns and advised management that the group travels should be within reason.
- b. <u>Collection Agency Services</u>: Mrs. Maria D.R. Taitano, Deputy General Manager of Admin/Finance understands that discussions were held some time back on the Port acquiring the services of a collection agency and was interested in re-looking into this service to assist in the port accounts receivables. It was noted that there would not be a financial impact to the Port as the services of the collection agency will be absorbed by the payor. Based on this, Finance is to provide the recommendation and breakdown of the accounts receivables to include disputes and Commercial will provide accounts receivables related to leases.
- c. <u>Load Center 4</u>: Mr. Pangelinan informed the Board on the ongoing repairs to load center 4 cable breakdown which provides power to the reefers. He assured the members that management is utilizing all resources and alternatives to mitigate this matter.
- **Acting Capacity:** Ms. Gibson asked the status of the acting positions that were to be reviewed by Department of Administration (DOA). The General Manager said the acting positions are allowed to continue for a series of 90 days and that those currently serving in the acting capacity are Joann Conway as Acting Financial Affairs Controller and Carmen Nededog as Acting Personnel Services Administrator. Ms. Gibson inquired whether DOA had determined anyone to be unqualified serving in the acting capacity. The General Manager said in the case of the Human Resources division, Ms. Nededog is the most senior personnel in that department and is currently working with DOA to address compensation for the work already performed in that acting capacity or promised compensation. Ms. Gibson clarified whether the continuance of an acting capacity is based on seniority or qualifications. The General Manager said at this time, it is based on what the Port has available to operate as there are no one internally that possess the expertise to perform the work and is unable to fill the position. The government has all these constraints on what the Port can or cannot do under these circumstances. She mentioned that management is closely working with DOA as to the details on this issue to ensure that the Port is not unfairly assigning personnel to perform without compensating them accordingly. The Chairman asked legal counsel to look into the application period to serve in the acting capacity.
- e. <u>Alan Searle Contract</u>: Ms. Gibson asked the status of the contract. Without objections, Mrs. Javier explained that the contract term is for one year with four year renewal options; not to exceed a total of five years. The initial contract term was from February 2011 to February 2012. The process of exercising renewal options is that the end user, which in this case

is Human Resource division and Corporate division, will formally notify the procurement office that services rendered is satisfactory and they wish to invoke the first renewal option period. At that point, procurement office will prepare and issue an amendment extending the contract for an additional one year extension period. However, in this case, the end user did not formally notify the procurement office to invoke the renewal option period, resulting in the contract to expire on its initial term. The Chairman clarified whether the appropriate option to exercise was done. Mrs. Javier replied negatively and mentioned that the contract was not extended after its initial term.

The Vice Chairperson asked whether the renewal option can be deferred if not invoked prior to the contract expiration period. Mrs. Javier replied negatively and said if no option renewal is exercised prior to the expiry of the contract term, such contract is no longer binding. The professional services will have to be re-solicited, if needed.

The Chairman clarified whether professional services were rendered by Alan Searle subsequent to February 2012 without a duly approved procurement extension contract neither by the Procurement division nor management. Mrs. Javier replied positively. The Vice Chairperson understands that two invoices have been paid out. Mrs. Javier clarified that there are a total of ten invoices, eight of which have been paid after the contract has expired, covering the period of March thru October 2012. Invoices for November and December 2012 are still outstanding. She said upon her acting appointment as Corporate Services Manager back in December 2012, Mrs. Javier advised Mr. Alan Searle to cease work. The Chairman expressed concern that the approval process that was required by the management to secure was not followed accordingly. He asked management to collect the information and data on the contract and provide to legal counsel for review.

- f. Insurance Renewal: Ms. Gibson asked the status of the insurance renewal. Mrs. Javier said the Port's Risk Manager is currently putting the specifications together which should be finalized by June 2013, then forwarded to GSA for bid issuance. Ms. Gibson expressed concern about the specifications identifying a 'rating' as there is no reason that no other carrier is eligible to participate because they are not 'A' rated. She mentioned that they are all brokers and agents. Mrs. Javier said the ratings is basically the 'claims' capability of paying out to the Port should there be a claim. After discussion, management was advised that in preparation of the bid specifications that it allow for broader participation to be review by legal counsel.
- g. <u>Power Consumption</u>: Provide financial impact on power consumption for the container yard lighting and EOC building.

VII. EXECUTIVE SESSION

No executive session items discussed.

VIII. ADJOURNMENT

There being no further business to discuss, it was moved by Ms. Gibson and seconded by the Vice Chairperson to adjourn the meeting at 2:25 p.m. The motion was unanimously passed.

General Manager Report To PAG Board of Directors June 24, 2013

General Port Operations

Emergency Procurement for LC-4

On Tuesday, May 7, 2013, it was determined that the power feeder cables that support Load Center 4 (LC-4) were burnt out and required repair and possible replacement. LC-4 provides the power source to the following Port operations: refrigerated container staging area, Gatehouse Operations and Yard Lighting. PAG activated its backup generator to support the LC4 impacted areas. At the request of PAG, Matson Navigation had their generators onsite to support any power failures that may arise.

The LC-4 Generator was placed into operation and provided backup power until Monday, May 27, 2013, when the backup generator supporting LC-4 broke down. The generator had overheated as a result of an oil pump pulley which came loose that damaged the upper engine components. In order to insure that a continued power supply could be provided to the refrigerated containers, the Port requested the assistance of Matson to operate its generators to support the refrigerated containers on hand and weekly vessel shipments of up to 125 refrigerated containers until the Port could address its power supply needs. Matson readily responded with assistance.

While the Port was able to address reefer operations with the assistance of Matson, the power supply to the Gatehouse was impacted due to the damaged lines and downed Port generator. During this time gate transactions were being performed manually. Gate personnel had to input transactions at another location to prevent a backlog and provide needed information to Tower personnel when working on vessel operations. On Tuesday, May 28, 2013, the Operations Manager requested generator service to avoid significant delays at the gate. At the same time the Port staff worked concurrently on the electrical lines to connect the Gatehouse to island power, which was accomplished later that day.

During this overall process, Port Management was reviewing options to address the replacement of the lines to include in house construction. The Port also developed specifications for the needed repairs that were provided to private contractors to submit a price quotation for power line replacement and installation. None of the price quotations received from six (6) vendors was below the \$50,000.00 limit that would have allowed the Port to proceed with its own construction contract.

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The GM sent a letter to Governor Eddie Calvo on Friday, May 31, 2013 requesting the Governor's assistance through Executive Order to declare a state of emergency to authorize an emergency procurement to replace the damaged feeder cables needed to sustain the refrigerated container staging area. If not addressed soon, the Port would not have been able to continue to accept containers requiring refrigeration services due to the lack of adequate facilities.

The GM outlined the following potential impacts:

- Delays or stoppage in the shipment of perishable goods due to inadequate facilities that may pose shortage of goods throughout the island community.
- A hazardous and unsafe working environment for operators as a result of poor or no lighting in the affected areas.
- The inability to maintain the required temperatures to these containers, which may shorten shelf-life and cause spoilage.
- The risk of the Port being exposed to litigation regarding liability issues from consignees.

In addition to requesting the replacement of the feeder cables, the GM also requested the immediate acquisition and installation of a generator to support LC-4 as the Port no longer had backup capability aside from the assistance provided by Matson.

The Governor immediately responded on the same day and provided his authorization and a certification for emergency procurement that was issued by General Services Agency. The Port was able to issue a small purchase procurement method to contractors to submit a price quote for the repair of the feeder cables. A total of six (6) contractors responded and DCK Pacific was selected as the lowest qualified contractor.

The funds for this construction project were paid for from the CIP Funds under line item for Other Small Projects. The FY 2013 budget approved by the Board had authorized \$750,000.00.

The Chief Procurement Officer Claudia Acfalle contacted the GM and relayed that after reviewing the specifications for a new generator for LC-4, one could not be procured in time to fall under the emergency certification umbrella of 30 days to be procured and delivered from a vendor. As such, Ms. Acfalle did relay that GSA would work with the Port to facilitate the procurement of the generator for LC-4.

Since this time, the Port acquired DCK to repair the power feeder cables for the amount of \$78,000.00.

In the interim the Port Maintenance staff moved the generator from LC -1 to replace the damaged generator and provide backup power at LC-4. The Port has also initiated the process

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with GSA to procure three (3) additional generators to replace the damaged generator at LC-4 (750 KW), replace the removed generator from LC-1 (500 KW) and provide additional backup generation power to the 240 (500KW) side of the refrigeration yard that had no backup generator in place. In addition, the temporarily replaced generator from LC-1 that has been moved to LC-4 until the new generator is installed and will then be moved to LC-3 to replace an inoperable generator that will be surveyed out of the Port inventory. The 2011 Port Security Grant pursued by the Port is the source of funding to pay for the new generators.

Port Reimbursement Request from Dept. of Agriculture

On Tuesday, June 11, 2013, the GM received a memorandum from the Port's Chief Planner informing her that the Port has yet to receive any reimbursements from the Department of Agriculture for the Repair and Maintenance project at the Agana Boat Basin. The amount to be reimbursed back to the Port is \$509.519.99. This project had been approved by the U.S. Department of Interior Fish and Wildlife Service.

The Port has brought this matter to the attention of Department of Agriculture's Deputy Director and the GM has also sent an Intra-government of Guam Work Request on Wednesday, June 12, 2013 to the Department of Agriculture/DAWR to address the appropriate reimbursement to the Port.

The GM will keep the Board updated on this matter. As there are request for needed repairs at the Agat Marina, the GM will request the approval of the Board to dedicate the reimbursed funds to repairs at the Agat Marina.

Long Term Disability

On Friday, May 31, 2013 the GM requested the assistance of Port Legal Counsel to review the Certificate from Standard Insurance regarding Long Term Disability for Port employees. Management wanted to get a better understanding of what options the Port had available with regards to employees on long term disability. The current practice has allowed employees designated under this category to still fill their staff position at the Port until the employee is eligible to retire. While the employee is being paid benefits during this time period by the insurance company, the Port is unable to fill their position with an active employee. This presents issues for the Port from an operational standpoint.

The GM inquired if an employee is unable to continue to perform their job due to long term health related issues, could medical retirement be pursued as is practiced by line departments in the Government of Guam?

The Port needs to determine what options are available to address these issues in the interest of both the employee and the Port. Right now the Port is at a disadvantage with regards to its operations if this practice continues.

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Workers Compensation

The Port Legal Counsel is finalizing the revisions to the Workers Compensation Specifications that were requested by the Port Board during its May 21, 2013 meeting. The revisions are expected to be completed this week and forwarded to GSA for a re-bid. Legal Counsel is reviewing the payroll listing, staffing patterns and Workers Compensation Expense claims history.

MOU with Revenue & Taxation

The draft MOU between the Port and Revenue and Taxation has been drafted by Port Legal Counsel and will be forwarded this week to Revenue and Taxation for review and hopeful concurrence. The GM has been in recent contact with Deputy Marie Benito and will schedule a meeting with her now that the draft revisions are completed. Board Member Gibson provided a copy of the MOU agreement with the University of Guam and Revenue and Taxation. A similar agreement is also in place with the Guam Memorial Hospital.

Sovereign Immunity

GEDA has been facilitating the dialogue between the Bank of Guam and the Guam Legislature on the amended language for sovereign immunity. GEDA Public Finance Division Manager Lester Carlson informed the GM that in discussions with the Bank of Guam and Senator BJ Cruz there had been an agreement on the concept that any judgment brought against the Port related to the \$10 million Bank of Guam loan would be paid solely from the revenues of the Authority.

GEDA provided proposed language and is awaiting a response back from the parties to finalize the draft legislation. The proposed amendment states:

Should any suit or action arise or be initiated to enforce any of the terms of any agreement, indenture, or pledge of revenues, concerning the indebtedness authorized under this Article, any judgment therein shall be paid solely from the revenues of the Authority and at no time shall any other property be subject to foreclosure or recourse to satisfy any suit or action authorized by this Article or judgment therein.

On Thursday, June 13, 2013 Port Counsel relayed to the GM that the proposed language was agreeable. The GM in turn notified Mr. Carlson that the Port had no objections to the language.

Senator Tom Ada also relayed on the same day that if the language could be finalized, he may be able to have the bill included on the June 17-20, 2013 session agenda. He also requested that the revised language be reviewed with Vice Speaker BJ Cruz who originally raised the concern regarding Port assets. Vice Speaker Cruz provided an immediate response that he had no objection to the revised language.

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On, Monday, June 17, 2013, Bill No. 86-32 was discussed on the session floor and moved to the Third Reading file for voting. The GM will continue keep the Board updated as this issue progresses.

Meeting with Mobil & Cementon

On Tuesday, May 28, 2013, Board Chairman Daniel Tydingco, Port Legal Counsel and Port Management held a joint meeting with representatives from Mobil and Cementon to address the issue of Cementon being able to attend to the construction of its connecting pipe to Gulf Pier. Board Chairman Daniel Tydingco facilitated the meeting and stated that the Board had recently passed a resolution to move this issue forward. He stated that the Port was present to determine how it could assist the respective parties in addressing a resolution to this matter.

Mobil Country Manager Jaime Andrés Ortega relayed during this meeting that he had met with the U.S. Coast Guard and had a possible solution that could be considered to minimize liability issues during the installation of the Cementon pipeline. This would involve the temporary removal of fuel from the pipelines which would minimize environmental violations that would have the greatest level of concerns. Mr. Ortega went on to discuss the possible suspension of the Management Agreement during the time Cementon is occupying Gulf Pier. He reiterated concerns Mobil had with the Coast Guard and EPA requirements that could hold his company liable during the construction stage. Mobil currently holds the Management Contract for Gulf Pier.

Cementon Representative Tricee Limtiaco conveyed that Cementon has been trying for quite some time to address the concerns raised by Mobil and very much wanted to see a resolution of this matter. She went on to outline the meetings and correspondences that had previously been pursued to resolve concerns raised by Mobil.

The GM stated that the key concerns raised by Mobil had to do with the liability issues and that further clarification from the U.S. Coast Guard would assist all parties in having a better understanding to move forward on this matter.

While there was much back and forth discussion on the impasse between the two parities the group agreed that it would be best to schedule a meeting collectively with the U.S. Coast Guard (USCG) to further discuss the respective responsibilities and liabilities during the construction of the Cementon pipeline.

The GM and Deputy GM met with the U.S. Coast Guard on Wednesday, May 29, 2013 to get a better understanding of the Coast Guard requirements to determine how to best seek resolution on the Mobil-Cementon issue. Attending this meeting on behalf of the U.S. Coast Guard were Commander Ted Harre, Chief Charles Ashmore and Petty Officer Jerry Meadows. The matters discussed included how security issues would be addressed and the jurisdiction of responsible parties during construction. Mobil is required as a fuel operator by the USCG to meet CFR 132

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requirements and also meet CFR 128 requirements due the size of fuel ships that dock and Gulf Pier. Cementon on the other hand would be required to meet CFR 105 requirements to transport cement from Gulf Pier and operate its facility. The challenge is coming to an agreement on which regulations would apply during the construction of Cementon's pipeline on a pier that has security and operational requirements for a fuel facility.

On Thursday, May 30, 2013, Port Management facilitated a meeting with Mobil and Cementon to include their respective legal counsels. The GM, Deputy GM for Operations and Port Counsel were present. Commander Ted Harre, Chief Charles Ashmore and Petty Officer Jerry Meadows were present on behalf of the U.S. Coast Guard.

The outcome of the meeting determined that the best option was to remove the fuel from the fuel line during the construction period. Mobil offered to also have no vessel scheduled during this period. Issues concerning the obligations and security needed to be addressed. The estimated construction time needed by Cementon was around 13 days. The parties agreed that an MOV was needed during the interim period that outlined the mitigating measures that needed to be taken in addition to the respective responsibilities of each party during construction.

Earlier this week Mr. Ortega had been in contact with Ms. Limitiaco relaying that a draft letter has been prepared for all parties to send to the USCG to include a collective agreement that had been discussed at their previous meeting. Mr. Ortega went on to state that the updates for the Construction Agreement had been completed "to remove the need for an express release from the authorities and add the security requirements during the construction period, based on having the petroleum pipelines packed with water and no vessel calls at the pier. With this no separate MOU should be required." Mr. Ortega concluded his response by stating that the agreements and internal documents were being reviewed by Mobil's Global Terminal Operations and Law departments in Fairfax and that once the reviews are completed the drafts would be shared with Cementon and PAG.

Port Management will keep the Board update on this matter until the construction issues are addressed and agreed to by the respective parties.

Transshipment Study PAG Docket 12-02 and PUC

Senator Tom Ada sent a letter on Wednesday, May 1, 2013 to PUC Chairman Jeffrey Johnson requesting that "the PUC require the Port Authority of Guam to include in their analysis of costs associated with transshipment containers, the cost of service associated with fuel that is offloaded, and later back-loaded, to determine if the current fifty percent (50%) discount is justified and if not, how the disparity should be rectified."

According to Senator Ada, the Transshipment Study for PAG 12-02 "will address issues related to transshipment containers, it will not evaluate the difference in rates assessed for fuel..." The focus of the study is primarily intended to address the cost related to each transshipment

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container to insure that adequate cost are being charged or determine if a higher or lower fee should be put in place for transshipment containers being loaded on to other vessels.

PUC Hearing for PAG Docket 12-02

On Tuesday, May 28, 2013, the Port Management attended the PUC hearing on the ALJ Report concerning the Transshipment Study for the Port Authority. Attending the hearing were the GM, Deputy GM for Operations, Deputy GM for Finance and Administration, Procurement and Supply Manager and Accountant III Richard Quimbao.

The PUC relayed that it found Senator Tom Ada's request to review the "disparity in the throughput charges between the fuel that is unloaded from a main tanker and later back-loaded onto smaller fuel tankers using the same pipelines and pumps." Senator Ada had requested that the PUC require the Port to add to its transshipment study further analysis of "the cost of service associated with fuel that is off-loaded and later back-loaded, to determine if the current fifty percent (50%) discount is justified, and if not, how the disparity should be rectified."

The GM was asked by the PUC Chairman if the Port had any comments concerning the amendment prior to the members voting on the amended order. The GM responded that the Port can provide the calculation numbers of what the cost could be. However, she did relay that the Port has concerns with the adverse impact any increase to the current charge for transshipment services could have on the current level of transshipment for containers and fuel that comes through the Guam Port. The Port has already experienced a decrease in cargo that is now directly being shipped through the Marshall Islands that previously was transshipped through Guam. The Port has reservations that Guam can lose its competitive edge as regional customers are seeking lower cost for the shipment of goods to their respective islands. The GM stated that this is a legitimate concern that the PUC members need to take into consideration as they review the financial analysis report on this request. There are other more significant factors that can reduce the current revenue received by the Port from transshipment cargo and fuel.

The PUC amended order approved that evening requested the following:

PAG shall prepare a study related to transshipment, which shall include, at a minimum: a review of whether the operational and maintenance costs (such as man hours, parts, PMC fees, insurance, depreciation, fuel, other wharf fees, etc.) associated with each transshipment container, are appropriately captured; and, if not, determine whether a full or reduced container surcharge fee should be assessed for those transshipment containers being loaded onto a feeder vessel; the transshipment study shall also provide an examination of the cost of service associated with fuel that is off-loaded, and later back-loaded, to determine if the current fifty percent (50%) discount is justified, and if not, how the disparity

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should be rectified; PAG shall file a report with the PUC regarding the results of its study by August 30, 2013.

PUC Docket PAG 12-01 - Gantry Crane 2

On Friday, May 31, 2013, the GM forwarded a letter to PUC Chairman Jeffrey C. Johnson providing the PUC with a status update on the procurement solicitation of Surplus Bid Package No. GSA-SS-002-13 for Gantry Crane 2.

According to information provided by GSA the bid submission deadline was held on Friday, May 24, 2013 and that a positive bidder response was provided and that GSA was in the process of finalizing the award.

The GM further relayed that in the event that the solicitation falls through, the Port will provide an alternative approach to address the demolition of Gantry Crane 2.

On Tuesday, June 18, 2013, the Port received a copy of the ALJ Report from the PUC on Gantry Crane #2. As the Port had previously reported GSA had confirmed a positive bidder and was now in the process of finalizing the award and that in the event that the solicitation falls through the Port will provide an alternative approach to address the demolition of the crane. The PUC determined that no additional information would be required from the Port on this matter at this time.

USDA Loan

On Thursday, June 13, 2013, the GM sent a letter to USDA Area II Director Joseph Diego informing him that the Port was still interested in the CF Direct Loan of \$2 million. The GM recommended the possible acquisition of cargo handling equipment and the maintenance of equipment needed for the following: one (1) Boom Lift, one (1) Compact Articulated Boom Lift, one (1) Portable Utility Air Compressor, one (1) Industrial Street Sweeper, one (1) Skid Mounted Fuel Tank, one (1) 20-Ton Forklift, two (2) Portable Dual Operation Welding Machines, three (3) 5-Ton Forklift, and eight (8) Tractors.

The GM also informed Mr. Diego that this matter would be submitted to the PAG Board of Directors during their June 24, 2013 meeting for consideration and approval. The GM also requested for Mr. Diego to relay to the Port what additional steps would need to be taken to complete the loan request.

According to USDA Community Programs Specialist Bernadette Balajadia, in communication with the Port's Deputy General Manager for Finance and Administration, the Port had to provide notice to USDA if it had a continued interest and wanted to change the purpose of the loan or use of the proceeds that were originally obligated since September 29, 2006. The Letter of

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Conditions from the loan would need to be further reviewed and new amendments would need to be added to address the "purpose, use of proceeds, interest rate and terms."

Ms. Balajadia further stated that at the time of the obligation the intermediate interest rate was 4.500% and the current intermediate interest rate is now at 4.000% up until June 30, 2013. Ms. Balajadia also provided the following cost breakdown for a \$2,000,000 USDA loan at an interest rate of 4.5000%:

Direct Loan - \$2,000,000 Interest Rate - 4.5000% Repayment years - 25 No. Payments per Year - 12 Amortization Factor - \$5.56 Direct Loan Payment - \$11,120 per \$1,000 loan with 12 Payments per year Direct Annual Payment - \$133,440

If the Board concurs on this request, Port Management will proceed to coordinate the details with USDA.

Replacement of Welded Steel Petroleum Distribution Piping and Appurtenances, GU-PAG-0011(004)

The GM signed a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with the Department of Public Works on Friday, May 17, 2013 for the Replacement of Welded Steel Petroleum Distribution Piping and Appurtenances, GU-PAG-0011(004), better known as the Mobil Fuel Pipeline. In the MOA, the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient, Transportation Equity Act: Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU), \$6,000,000 was provided to construct the Cabras Island Intermodal Facility in 2005. A total of \$3,535,957.78 had since been allocated for the construction of the Route 11 Shore Protection at Cabras Island. There now remains approximately \$2,464,042.22 available for the use of the Port Authority and this amount has been designated for the Mobil Fuel Pipeline repair project.

The Department of Public Works recently issued an invitation for bid for the pipeline replacement. The deadline for interested bidders to respond is scheduled for Wednesday, July 10, 2013. The contract time allotted for this project is three hundred (300) calendar days after a Notice to Proceed is issued. The solicitation documents were made available on Tuesday, June 11, 2013 and a pre-bid conference was held on Tuesday, June 18, 2013. According to the Port Engineer Manager Simeon Delos Santos, eleven (11) interested companies attended the pre-bid conference.

The GM will keep the Board updated on the status of this bid procurement by DPW on behalf of PAG.

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Government Claim by Anthony J.D. Meno

On Thursday, June 6, 2013, the Port received a government claim from Mr. Anthony J.D. Meno on behalf of his son, Gabriel Jude Meno. Mr. Meno is the spouse of Ms. Bernadette Meno. Mr. Meno is filing his claim against the Port Board of Directors and Officers on behalf of its insurance and company reimbursement policy. Mr. Meno claims that "actions taken by the PAG against my son that constitute an invasion of privacy and publication of private facts."

Mr. Meno's claim was forwarded to Legal Counsel for review.

Meeting with Office of Economic Adjustment (OEA)

On Monday, June 10, 2013, the GM and Deputy GM for Operations met with OEA Gary Kuwabara and PB's Senior Project Manager Jeff Peck. Mr. Kuwabara opened the meeting discussing the current impact that sequestration was having on the OEA and relayed that the budget cuts would be in place until the end of the current fiscal year. As a result, Mr. Kuwabara would not be able to visit Guam again until December of 2013. He also had to limit the number of days of his current visit as he was unable to travel on furlough days,

Mr. Kuwabara stated that the lion share of OEA federal grants provided to Guam have been awarded to the Port Authority. He also stated that February 2014 was the deadline to cleanly close out about 16 grants with the Government of Guam and that he would like to see the Port receive intended deliverables. He added that in 2012 there had been a game plan between MIRAD, Port, Legislature and the Governor's Office to facilitate the implementation and completion of the funded grants.

Mr. Kuwabara relayed that while federal resources are being provided to assists the Port Authority, the Port also had a responsibility to address its own organic growth and sustainability, acquire additional cranes and address the financing for the Service Life Extension (SLE).

The GM provided Mr. Kuwabara with an update of the current initiatives by the Port to address its proposed tariff increase to the PUC and the collaborative effort between Senator Tom Ada, GEDA and the Port to address amended language proposed by Senator BJ Cruz to limit repayment back to the lending institution to be financial in nature and not be able to acquire tangible assets of the Port. The GM further stated that the Port has been in collaboration with the PUC and anticipates that the Tariff request should be addressed by October of 2013.

Mr. Kuwabara imparted that it was important to see resources from the Port and other federal entities being invested in the improvements and upgrades to the overall Port facilities. He further stated that OEA has been a champion to see the real need and provide support, but also encouraged additional financial participation to strengthen future financial request to OEA. He added that OEA would evaluate the following 1) validate that there is a substantive need; and 2) the ability of the Government of Guam to underwrite those improvements.

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The Deputy GM for Operations inquired if OEA could fund the design work for the Hotel Wharf project. Mr. Kuwabara responded that OEA could not provide funds for design work. He did relay that a field analysis, reports, and an environmental assessment could be supported with OEA funding. The GM outlined the intended future uses for Hotel Wharf and also the additional upgrades and construction that would be needed.

Mr. Kuwabara requested if the Port could send him regular updates on the progress of MIRAD funded and other Port funded projects. The GM responded that the updates will be provided to keep him posted on Port construction activities until his next visit to Guam at the end of the year.

Project Oversight Team (POT) Teleconference

The next POT teleconference is scheduled for Tuesday, June 25, 2013, at 7:00 a.m. Guam time. The previous POT teleconference was held on Tuesday, April 30, 2013. The GM and Board Member Benito will participate on behalf of the Port.

Meeting with PB

On Tuesday, May 28, 2013, GM, Deputy GM for Operations and Deputy GM for Finance and Administration met with PB Senior Project Manager Jeff Peck and PB staff Blair Garcia, Mike Medve, Hardik Gajjar, and Zach Sprute to provide an overview of planned assignments during their current visit to Guam. Among the list of issues discussed included the fuel and transshipment study as requested by the PUC, cargo terminal, Hotel Wharf, Hagatna Marina, Harbor of Refuge, Family Beach, Tristar fuel line, Golf Pier, Mobil Tank Farm, Seaplane Ramp and cargo forecast.

On Friday, May 31, 2013, an out-brief meeting was attended to by all the parties to provide an update on assigned projects. More detailed minutes on these two meetings have been generated by PB if desired by the Board Members for further review.

Informational Section 7 Consultation on the Guam Port Modernization Project

The Port received notice on Tuesday, June 18, 2013 from MARAD's Brian Varney that that the U.S. DOI Fish and Wildlife Service had relayed on Thursday, June 13, 2013, that no further action would be needed to comply with Section 7 of the Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.) Act as long as the project description outlined for the Port modernization projects are followed. According to the letter from Fish and Wildlife to MARAD's Michael Carter,

Based on the project description, including the implementation of the conservation measures you provided, we concur with your determination that the project may affect,

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but is not likely to adversely affect the Mariana moorhen, and hawksbill or green turtles. In addition, your agreement to develop a HACCP Plan and implement increased BTS interdiction adequately addresses our concerns regarding invasive species, and therefore, we conclude your project is not likely to adversely affect other listed species. Unless the project description changes, or new information reveals that the effects of the proposed action may affect listed species in a manner or to an extent not considered, or a new species or critical habitat is designated that may be affected by the proposed action, no further action pursuant to the Act is necessary.

This is an important approval as it further clears the way for the Port to address its facility upgrades, demolition and yard expansions as outlined in the modernization plans for the expenditures of funds provided by MIRAD.

In addition, Mr. Varney provided a copy of the Brown Tree Snake Containment Plan that includes the Port Authority as one of the critical areas on Guam for BTS interdiction. A copy of the BTS trap stations located at the Port has been included in this report for Board Member reference.

Customs & Quarantine Rental Space

On Thursday, June 13, 2013, the GM received a request from Vice Speaker BJ Cruz inquiring as to the amount of monthly rent that the Port has been charging Guam Customs & Quarantine. On Friday, June 14, 2013, the GM provided a response to Vice Speaker Cruz informing him that the prevailing rate for office space at the Port had increase from \$1.37ft2 to \$1.63ft2 in April of 2009. Customs and Quarantine occupies approximately 702 ft2 of office space on the first floor of the Port Administration building. In addition, Customs is charged a Common Area Maintenance fee of \$449.28 per month. The total amount owed to the Port for monthly rent and maintenance fee charges is \$1,593.54.

The GM relayed that Customs had not been paying rent, utilities or common area fees to the Port. The explanation historical explanation provided by Customs is that the rental fee has not been funded for in its annual budget.

The Port intends to revisit the rental issue with Customs as these costs have become an added burden on Port resources and finances.

Status of Air-Conditioner Installations

Maintenance Manager Ernie Candoleta and his crew have been working with the airconditioning contractor Guam Modern Office Supply to address the installation of much awaited units within the Port facilities. Below is a list of the current installation status:

- 4) Strategic Planning Office installation completed for one (1) 24,000 Btu Split Unit.
- 5) Payroll Conference/Lounge installation completed for one (1) 24,000 Btu Split Unit
- 6) Operation Manager's Office pending installation for one (1) 24,000 Btu Split Unit.
- 7) Fleet Maintenance Lounge/Office pending installation for one (1) 24,000 BTU Split Unit.

According to the Maintenance Division, the remaining units will be scheduled for installation as soon as notice is received from the vendor.

2013 National Homeland Security Conference, "Homeland Security begins with Hometown Security," Los Angeles, California, June 4-7, 2013

The Port Authority of Guam participated in the 2013 National Homeland Security Conference that was held in Los Ange13les, California from June 4-7, 2013. General Manger Joanne Brown attended the conference along with PSGP Program Manager Joe Javellana III, Procurement and Supply Manager Alma Javier, Maintenance Manager Ernest Candoleta and Program and Training Coordinator (Port Police Division) Frank Lujan.

The primary agenda of the conference was to update participants on the current status of national security issues and relay vital information to strengthen all U.S. jurisdictions, including maritime and port operation facilities, to prepare and respond to security threats and other possible terrorist incidents. In addition to the formal conference agenda, the Guam delegation also had the

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opportunity to tour the Port of L.A. on Wednesday, June 5, 2013, to include a boat tour of the harbor and a tour of the Long Beach Security Operations Center on Friday, June 7, 2013.

GM Brown attended the General Sessions with the Port delegation and also attended four sessions addressing the following topics: The International Terrorist Threat: Today and Tomorrow, Collaboration in Port Security: Local, State & Federal; The Power of Partnerships: Helping Businesses Prepare, Respond, and Recover, and Civil-Military Relations.

Travel Reports from each of the conference participants have been submitted to Port administration providing more details on the content of this trip.

Technical Design Team Meetings

The Port GM, Planning Division Staff, Operations Manager and Port Engineer continue to attend weekly meetings with EA Engineers for the MIRAD projects.

Ribbon-Cutting Ceremony for Route 11

A ribbon-Cutting Ceremony for Route 11 has been scheduled by the Department of Public Works for Tuesday, July 9, 2013, at 10:00 a.m. Governor Calvo has been invited as the key note speaker. All Board Members and Port staff are invited to attend this significant event.

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Port Safety Issues

Reported Work Injury

On Tuesday, May 28, 2013, the GM received a report from Safety Inspector III Paul Salas that Electrical Supervisor Kenneth Camacho had been injured when he fell from a swivel chair at the Check Point Building at around 5:10 p.m. Mr. Camacho had been working with his crew on the panel boxes in the electrical room to power up the building. Mr. Camacho reported that he had pain on his buttocks and tail bone after his fall and was transported by medics to GMH for further examination.

The Safety Office determined as a result of its inspection that "the chair's locking mechanism and swivel base attached to the sear was damaged. The base plate locking in the adjustable cylinder was broken (damaged) through wear and tear."

Mr. Camacho was issued the 101a form and the WCC forms 201 and 202 were also issued to both Mr. Camacho and Acting Facility Maintenance Superintendent Ray Munoz to be completed.

The broken chair has since been removed from the Check Point office and the GM had instructed the Safety Division to inspect and survey out any defective chairs from the respective Port offices. The GM has also relayed this request to the Division Mangers to inspect the chairs within their divisions.

POLA Crane 16 and Tractor 84

On Thursday, June 6, 2013, the GM received a report from Safety Inspector III, Paul Salas concerning an incident between POLA # 16 and a bare chassis during the discharging of containers from the vessel Mell Sudong.

According to Mr. Salas, on June 3, 2013, Crane Operator Anthony Conception was discharging containers from the Mell Sudong onto a chassis that was being drayed by Equipment Operator III Kevin Sanchez operating Tracker 84. According to the report, Mr. Sanchez "drayed the bare chassis too high of an angle on the 5th wheel making it difficult for the container to set in the corner castings." At the same time, Mr. Conception was setting down a 20 foot container (FCTU 286033) unto a bare chassis. During this operation, the container was caught on the front bolster landing on the metal frame of the chassis. As a result, the metal frame was cracked in half from the weight of the 30.5 ton container containing cement. Fortunately, there was no damage to the container and no personal injuries to the Port staff.

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The Safety Office concluded that the cause of the accident "was inattention and complacency by the crane operator" and also recommended that this matter be forwarded to the Accident Review Board for final recommendations before being forwarded to the GM.

Reported Work Injury

On Wednesday, June 5, 2013, the GM received a report from Safety Inspector III Paul Salas informing her that earlier that day around 11:08 a.m., Cargo Checker Angela Aguigui had been assigned to Auto Lot (2 Charlie) to issue out vehicles. After the completion of her assignment, Ms. Aguigui was attempting to close and secure the metal gates at the location. There were adverse weather conditions to include rain and gusty winds. As Ms. Aguigui was closing the gate at the Auto Lot, the right gate swung towards her as a result of the strong wind. According to the report, "she tried to hold the metal gate with her right hand when she sustained a minor cut on her wrist from a jagged edge of the metal gate frame. She sustained minor laceration to her right wrist."

The Safety Office report determined that there was no securing mechanism for the gate doors in an open position and that the cause of the incident "was failure to ensure metal gates were properly secured in placed while issuing vehicles was in progress."

Ms. Aguigui was taken by her Supervisor to GMH for medical attention and the appropriate WCC forms 101a, 201 and 202 were issued and filled out.

The Port Safety Office recommended that the corroded gate be repaired to prevent another incident and that this incident be discussed during Port safety meetings.

Reported Work Injury

On Wednesday, Jun 12, 2013, the GM received a report for Safety Inspector III Paul Salas informing her that on that same day at around 7:45 a.m. Administrative Assistant for the Transportation Division Jesusa Cruz had fallen and sustained abrasions on her hands and left knee. Ms. Cruz been walking between the LC-1 building and the old Horizon building and encountered an uneven service on the way to her office when this incident happened. According to the report, Ms. Cruz was transported by medics to GMH for medical evaluation and then returned to work with instructions to report to her primary doctor the following day.

The Safety Office determined that "the uneven surface was about 3-inches higher where she stepped onto causing her to fall forward onto the pavement injuring her left knee and both hands." The Safety Office also determined that "inattention to proper footing and failure to mark (an) uneven surface" was the primary cause of this injury. The Safety Office further recommended that a work request be generated by the Port Facility Division to paint and mark the identified location and that this matter also be further discussed during the next safety briefing.

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The appropriate WCC forms 101a/b, 201 and 202 were given to Mr. Mike Taijeron, Transportation Supervisor for completion.

Reported Work Injury

On Friday, June 14, 2013, the GM received a report from Safety Inspector III Paul Salas that Heavy Equipment Mechanic I Floriano Javier had been assisting with the installation of an exhaust pipe on Saturday, June 1, 2013 for the LC-4 generator and was struck by the exhaust pipe that broke off the top section. At the time it was reported that a forklift was in operation lifting the exhaust pipe and that a top section had fallen off.

The Safety Report went on to state that Mr. Javier "was okay after the incident as he continually worked that day (Saturday) and Sunday. He did not report to work on Monday through Friday, June 03 - 07, 2013. He requested to see a doctor because he was concerned over a bruise and lump on the front left shoulder. WCC form 101a/b was issued to Mr. Javier for medical attention at GMH. WCC forms 201 and 202 were given to his supervisor Mr. Mark Manibusan for completion."

The report concluded that the "primary cause(s) of this incident resulting in work injury was the failure to ensure the exhaust pipe was stable in the process of installation. The welded section of the exhaust pipe was weak to withstand the pressure exerted by the forklift. The upper section of the exhaust pipe was too long and had to be cut off to fit with the generator exhaust flange." The GM held a meeting with the Deputy General Manager for Operations and the Safety Administrator as she was concerned about the late notice of this incident being forwarded to Management. In addition, she requested that the Deputy General Manager provide further review into this matter and determine if proper procedures were followed during the operation of the forklift. Moreover, the GM wanted to know if proper procedures were followed after the incident to advise the employee to immediately go to GM to be examined.

The GM also relayed to the Safety Administrator that the Division Managers, Superintendents and Leaders all need to be mindful of following proper safety procedures and notifications in the event of the incident to insure that the safety and interest of the employee is addressed and that proper documentation and notifications are in place to address the interest of the Port.

Reported Work Injury

On Monday, June 17, 2013, the GM received a report from Safety Inspector II Paul Salas that Program Coordinator II Ronald Ayuyu had fallen from a swivel office chair on that same day and had sustained an on-the-job injury at his office located on the second floor of the Port Administration building.

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Mr. Ayuyu was provided with the appropriate 101 a/b forms and the WCC 201 and 202 forms filled in and completed by the Interim Deputy GM for Operations.

Industrial Accident on the Pacific Condor

On Tuesday, June 18, 2013, the GM received a report for Safety Inspector III Paul Salas concerning an industrial accident on board the Pacific Condor vessel. Earlier in the morning the GM had received a call from the Deputy Manager for Operations informing her that two sixty foot concrete poles were being unloaded off the vessel, when a strap broke off, dropping the bottom half of one pole on the weather deck and the second pole into Hatch #1. The ship's crane was being used during the operation. Both poles and a 40-foot container (MATZ 230858) were damaged in the incident that occurred around 4:50 a.m.

The pole had been wrapped with nylon straps on each side that were rated to carry a load of 5 tons per strap. Since the straps were wrapped the maximum rated load was 4 tons per strap. The estimate weight of each pole is around 5 tons. The report stated that the primary cause of the incident was that the lifting device (nylon strap) was rated too low for the load. The report further stated that Mr. Vincent Asanoma was the winch operator and that there were no spotters for the operator. The report went on to state that other employees involved with this incident include Stevedore Supervisor John Borja, Stevedore Leader Joey Retuyan, Rigger David Naputi, and Stevedores Jeffrey Tedtaotao, George Quidachay, and Lester Vanmeter.

The GM is awaiting the recommendations from the Accident Review Board to determine appropriate action to take concerning this matter.

Training Exercises

Annual Typhoon Pakyo 2013 Function Exercise

The Port participated in the Annual Typhoon Pakyo 2013 Functional Exercise (FE) that was scheduled for June 17-18, 2013 at the Emergency Operations Center at the Guam Homeland Security/Office of Civil Defense. Port representatives also had to attend at two (2) day FEMA training from June 10-13, 2013.

Safety Administrator Frank Roberto and Safety Inspector III Paul Salas attended on behalf of the Port.

Threat and Risk Assessment Course

On Tuesday, May 28, 2013, the Port received a request from Homeland Security Critical Infrastructure Protection Coordinator Denise M. Cruz for a site visit to the Port for the Texas A&M Engineering Extension Services (TEEX) Threat and Risk Assessment course for Friday, May 31 from 9am-1130am. According to Ms. Cruz the purpose of the visit was to prepare

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"participants to conduct a jurisdictional Threat Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) on Guam's Critical Infrastructure(s)."

The Port had been selected as one of (3) three sites that also included the Guam Memorial Hospital and the Guam Power Authority and Guam. Port Police Chief Doris Aguero, PO2 Dave Esplana, and PO2 Joy Quichocho Cruz participated in this training course on behalf of the Port.

Legislative Matters

Testimony on Resolution No. 106-32

On Tuesday, June 12, 2013, the GM provided a written testimony to Senator Tina Muna Barnes Committee on Committee on Municipal Affairs, Tourism, Housing and Hagåtña Restoration and Redevelopment Authority regarding Legislative Resolution No. 106-32, Relative to Supporting the Development of a Public Policy, Investment and Operational Frame Work for Establishing a Sustainable and Green Cruise Industry in Micronesia with Guam Serving as the Regional Hub.

The GM's testimony relayed information that the Guam Port is a multi-purpose facility with limited dock/berthing space. During the period from 2011 to 2013, the Port has received seven (7) passenger vessel calls. For 2014, the Port has been notified to expect an additional two (2) passenger vessels. The average length of stay per vessel is from twelve (12) to twenty-four (24) hours.

The GM also relayed that if there were policy plans adopted to grow the passenger vessel visits to Guam or have visitors stay for a longer period of time, significant financial resources would need to be invested to upgrade and expand Port facilities. This is needed to avoid disrupting the current flow of commerce that could be adversely impacted as passenger vessels have berthing priority.

The GM concluded her testimony by informing the Committee that Hotel Wharf is a 500' facility could serve as a prime location to host an expanded cruise industry on Guam. However, significant repairs would be needed to address structural issues and improvements at Hotel Wharf. The wharf was originally built by the U.S. Department of Defense in 1948, sixty-five (65) years ago.

Port Rent Inquiry for Customs and Quarantine

On Thursday, June 13, 2013, the GM received a letter from Senator BJ Cruz requesting information concerning the amount that the Port is charging Customs & Quarantine for the rental of office space in the Port Administration Building. He also wanted to know if the cost has increased or remained stable over the past ten years.

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In response, the GM sent him a letter on Friday, June 14, 2013, informing him that Customs and Quarantine occupies an area of 702 square feet of office space and has not been paying rent to the Port. In addition, Customs has not paid a Common Area Maintenance fee in the amount of \$449.28 per month and has not done so since April 2009. The monthly charge that Customs should be paying to the Port on a monthly basis for rent is 1,144.26. The combined charge with the maintenance fee totals \$1,593.54.

The response that has historically been provided by Customs to the Port is that Customs has monetary constraints and that funding has not been identified in its annual budget cycle.

As for the Port fee for square foot area, the cost had risen from \$1.37 per square foot charged by the Port since 1993, to \$1.63 per square foot since April of 2009.

Oversight Hearing

On Thursday, June 13, 2013, the Board Chairman received a letter from Senator Tom Ada informing him that the Committee on Public Safety, Infrastructure and Maritime Transportation would be conducting an Oversight Hearing on Tuesday, July 9, 2013 at 1:30pm (later changed to 2:00 p.m.) in the Public Hearing Room of *I Liheslaturan Guåhan*.

The Port is requested to respond to the following issues:

- 1. Gantry Cranes
- 2. Berths F4, F5, and F6
- 3. Employee Safety and Welfare
- 4. Federal Grants

Ms. Meno further requested that she would like to receive "these audio files within 4 working days unless, as required under Guam law, you can produce a specific court order sealing these audio files past today's expiration of the 6-month time period for the November 28, 2012 meeting which was continued on December 3, 2012 and December 5, 2012."

On Friday, May 31, 2013, the Port provided a response to Ms. Bernadette Meno informing her that that 5 G.C.A. § 8111(c)(7) provides, "The transcript of such meeting shall be sealed for a period of six (6) months, and shall thereafter be a public document unless there is a court order, further sealing the transcript." Please also note that under 5 G.C.A. § 10103(e)(1), PAG is entitled to the additional time it needs to assemble and transcribe the audio recordings. Transcriptions will be provided to you no later than Friday, June 7, 2013.

The Port provided a response to Ms. Meno on Tuesday, June 4, 2013.

The Port provided a response to GTA on Wednesday, May 22, 2013 to the FOIA request received from GTA Legal Counsel Andrew S. Quenga on Friday, May 17, 2013 that was reported during the May 21,2013 Board Meeting, requesting the following:



Operating Performance:




Total Operating Revenues as of May 2013 was \$27.7 million, which consist of \$22.4 in cargo revenues and \$5.0 million in Facilities, Leases, and Other Services.

FY13 YTD cargo revenue is 22% higher than last year's total (\$18.0 mil) and same as Budget (\$22.0 mil). Crane Surcharge is 10% of year to date cargo revenue and 31.7% higher than last month April total (\$1.7 mil).

FY13 YTD Facilities, Leases, and Other Services as of May is 9 % higher than last year (\$4.9 mil) and 7% higher than budget (\$4.5 mil).

Overall Operating Revenues as of May is 2% higher than Budget (\$23.7 mil) and 19% higher than last year's year to date May (\$23 mil).

Total number of containers handled as of May 2013 was 62,296 less than 1% decrease compared to last year May total of 62,381.




Total Operating Expenses as of May 2013 was \$25.4 million, which is 6% lower than Budget (\$26.9 mil) and 12% higher than last year's total operating expenses (\$22.8).


Total Overtime as of May 2013 was \$880,142 which is 277% higher than last year May (\$233k). Direct Labor Revenue as of May was \$1.7m, which is 90% higher than last year and 24% higher than budget. \$1.0 million of the total direct labor revenue is related to Overtime, Premium Pay and Holiday Pay. Direct Labor charges are for services performed by Port employees under special service request and differentials under the throughput.

Year to date Operating Revenues minus the Year to date Operating Expenses resulted to an Operating Income of \$2.4m as of May 31,, 2013.

Non Operating Revenues and Expenses consist of the following: \$662k-Loss on Asset Disposal (G2), \$585k-Retirement contribution for COLA, Supplemental and Medical/Dental/Life Insurance expenses, \$430k-Interest expense on loans, \$1.9k-Federal Reimbursements and \$119k Interest Income. The net total of non operating expenses and revenues as of April is a negative \$404 thousand.

The Total Net Income as of May is \$2.5 mil.

Accounts Receivable Trade (net) as of May 31, 2013 is \$8.3 million.

Aging Status is a follows: 61% - Current, 8% - over 30 days, 11% - over 60 days, 2% - over 90 days and 18% - over 120 days.

Accounts Payable Trade as of May 31, 2013 is \$2.7 million which is 12.5% higher than last month ending balance of \$2.4 million.

An increase in expenditures is for CIP progress billing: \$591k-GPD Marine Renovation PHSE II, and \$418k- Port Security Enhancement Project.

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

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



INTRODUCTION

This matter comes before the Guam Public Utilities Commission (the "PUC") pursuant to a Petition filed by the Jose D. Leon Guerrero Commercial Port, Port Authority of Guam ("PAG") on June 18, 2012, whereby PAG requested review and approval of the Sales Agreement, and the Interim Maintenance Agreement, related to the acquisition of the Port of Los Angeles ("PoLA") cranes.

BACKGROUND

In its August 27, 2012 Order, the PUC preliminarily approved the Sales Agreement and the Interim Maintenance Agreement, but required PAG to file a report with the PUC. by February 15, 2013, regarding its plans for Gantry Crane #2 ("Gantry 2"). On February 26, 2013, the PUC requested another status report regarding Gantry 2 by May 31, 2013. On May 24, 2013, PAG transmitted a report to the Administrative Law Judge of the PUC (the "ALJ") that detailed the status of its efforts to dispose of the crane. On May 31, 2013, PAG transmitted another report to the ALJ indicating that the Department of Administration's General Services Agency ("GSA") was in the process of finalizing an award, which would effectively dispose of Gantry 2.



DISCUSSION

In its May 24, 2013 report, PAG indicated that Gantry 2 was surveyed and then transferred to GSA by February 18, 2013. PAG included in this submission a January 7, 2013 Report Survey, wherein PAG personnel found Gantry 2 to be "beyond economical repair" and, therefore, recommended that the crane be tendered to GSA "for further disposition." PAG also included in its submission a February 8, 2013 Equipment Survey Report, wherein PAG personnel further found that the parts for Gantry 2 were: "obsolete, not easy to maintain," "deteriorating," "defective and malfunctioning," "worn," and requiring "complete replacement"; "replacement parts" "now obsolete, and are therefore unavailable.

Thereafter, GSA issued Bid Invitation No. GSA-SS-002-13, which included Gantry 2 as part of GSA's items for bid, offered for a minimum bid of \$25,000.00. PAG has indicated that, pursuant to the invitation for bids, the "[s]cope of work involves the demolition and removal of the asset from the Port through a contractual solicitation."²

In its May 31, 2013 report, PAG indicated that "GSA has confirmed positive bidder response for Gantry Crane 2 and is in the process of finalizing the award."³

PAG has further indicated that should the solicitation prove unsuccessful, "PAG will provide an alternative approach on the future plans or demolition of Gantry Crane 2."

CONCLUSION

Based on the information provided by PAG in its May 23, 2013 and May 31, 2013 reports, the ALJ is encouraged by PAG's efforts to dispose of Gantry 2. Therefore, no additional information from PAG will be required at this time.



PURPOSE: The Port Authority of Guam (PAG) recognizes the need to implement internal controls over check signing and to update instructions to depositories so that there is a clear understanding regarding the PAG's check signing authority.

SCOPE: The provisions of this policy shall be utilized and adhered to by all PAG management and employees and financial institutions who provide banking services to PAG.

DISCUSSION: The Finance Division issues checks several times each month in payment of vendor invoices and employee payroll deductions. There are 26 payroll periods each fiscal year, and paychecks are issued two or three times per month. Payroll checks require only one signature, which can be manually signed or stamped. Operating account checks shall bear two signatures, which can also be signed manually or stamped.

Acquisition of operational supplies and services by the PAG section or divisions shall go through the requisition and approval processes. Approval authority is granted as follows: Division Heads, Budget Clearance, Financial Affairs Controller, and General Manager.

Equipment costing over \$1000 shall be classified as Fixed Assets and a justification letter must be submitted to the Financial Affairs Controller and the General Manager for approval before the procurement process is begun.

Because of the number of checks processed for signature each week, it is prudent to assign and authorize multiple signatures for PAG check disbursements as follows:

- 1. General Manager
- 2. Deputy General Manager
- 3. Operations Manager *
- 4. General Accounting Supervisor
 Financial Affairs Controller (Payroll Account only)

POLICY: General Account checks written for \$100,000 or less may be signed by any of the authorized signers indicated on the back signature card. Accounts Payable Office (Accountant III) verifies and approves all vendor invoices and attaches all supporting documents (purchase order, certification letter of services performed from the assigned division and receiving register). Checks issued through the general account that are within the established threshold will be initially delivered to the General Accounting Supervisor for review of supporting documents and signature. It is then forwarded to the Deputy General Manager (Admin/Finance) for his/her review and second signature. In the absence of either officer, the alternate signers would be the Deputy General Manager (Operations), or General Manager. *

For checks over \$100,000, the order established for manual signing will be the Deputy General Manager (Admin/Finance) as the first signatory and the General Manager as the second signatory. In the absence of the Deputy General Manager (Admin/Finance), it will be the General Accounting Supervisor as the first signatory. In the absence of the General Manager, the Deputy General Manager (Operations) will be the alternate signatory on behalf of the General Manager. *

All efforts on the order established for manual signing over \$100,000, shall be exhausted prior to the Operations Manager signing as an alternate signatory. *

The certifying officer will be the Financial Affairs Controller. The certifying officer may not be a check signatory for general account disbursements.

Payroll checks for \$10,000 or less will be signed by the Financial Affairs Controller. In his/her absence, the alternates would be the General Accounting Supervisor, Operations Manager, Deputy General Manager, or General Manager. Payroll checks over \$10,000 will be manually signed by the General Manager. In the absence of the General Manager, the particular order of alternate signers will be the Deputy General Manager, Financial Affairs Controller, General Accounting Supervisor and the Operations Manager. *

This policy prohibits the signatories from signing checks where the signatory is the payee. For example, a check to the General Manager should not have the General Manager as one of the signatories. Payments where a signatory is a party to the transaction (travel reimbursement or per diem, for example) is not a signatory for that particular payment.

Stamp signatures should always be kept inside the vault and will only be issued by the Petty Cash Custodian (Accountant I or Accountant III) to the particular signatory.

Any unbudgeted expenditures must be approved by the Board of Directors before any check disbursements are made.

1. Gregorio D. Perez Marina – The status of grant reimbursement for the \$940K we spent on floating docks and piling extension work of which Port share was \$165K is as follows. We are in the process of seeking the reimbursement in the amount of \$509K from Agriculture for the remaining balance considering we incurred construction costs at the front end of each project.

Also, we are currently positioning ourselves for another rate revisit for GDP. I have staff going out to GDP today to get the readings for the 5 newly installed water submeters. This will be the first attempt to capture water consumption per dock facility since the water lines were replaced on May 21, 2013 and the old account was terminated on May 22nd. Installation of sub meters was done at our request to begin properly allocating consumption costs to ensure cost recovery methodologies are applied to such costs across the various dock facilities.

The only ongoing CIP project at GDP is the sheet piling project and according to CIP it is at approximately 60% completion. In connection to this, staff has and continues to work diligently with GFCA on issue of impact the project is having on their operations, with a focus on the bunkering component of their business considering it accounts for 20-25% of their revenues. The objective was set to chase a cut of 5 days from original construction schedule to enable quicker return time to bunkering as well as ensure all further efforts forward are made to complete GFCA side project by end June.

At the request of the Deputy General Manager, Ops, enclosed is a listing of Dock A tenants that have been displaced as a result of the sheet piling project. The listing also details disposition and/or placement of vessels during the interim as a result of the project.

2. Agat Marina Small Boat Harbor – Staff, with the assistance of the Operations and Facility personnel performed general cleanup of the facility. In connection to this, and at direction of Harbor master, Facility is charged with continuing the removal of all the damaged and detached slips within the Marina of which began on June 21, 2013.

A plan aimed to address the condition of Dock A was put together by staff in recent weeks. A copy of plan is attached for your information. Being proposed was for the Port to use the \$250K WesPac award to initiate the procurement of a new dock by way of the IFB process. The proposed plan is attached for your review.

Known is that this grant award is obviously well short of the funding level needed for the dock based on government estimates. Initially, it was thought best to issue an IFB primarily for an aluminum framed composite decking dock with an option to submit costing for wooden frame composite decking. However, according to Procurement, this may lead to protest and recommended we go basic bid instead. In parallel, staff was to also pick up the pace on efforts to recoup \$509K due back the Port for the completed GDP projects. I was informed that timeline for reimbursement maybe within two (2) weeks.

3. Marina Profit/Loss Worksheet - per tasking from the GM, a general P/L report for the Marinas was prepared and provided to the DGM,A on May 23 2013. There is a perception that the marinas are being subsidized by the Port even with this exercise it is still difficult to assess true level of subsidy due to the absence of proper accounting and expense allocation mechanisms.

The reporting period covered three prior years. Highlights from this report are attached for further review.

In summary, over the three year period:

- The Port realized \$748K in gross revenue.
- The Port spent \$290K or 38% of revenues on utilities for which rates are included into slip fees.
- The Port spent \$92K on M&R or 12% of total revenues.
- The Port realized a net profit/loss of \$65K, -\$2K and \$90K for years 2010 2013 respectively.
- 4. Alternative Management Regime The October 6, 2011 report to the Board was provided to GM/DGMA for review. Purpose was to re-establish the case to re-present matter to the Board for consideration. Staff is currently working on a task from the GM related to this but is not position to do so at the moment. Scope of task involves preparing the business case forward to support self sustaining marina operations. Considered in the AMR study were Public Sector Operation, Public Sector Operation (As Improved), Privatization and Joint Public Private Partnership.

Obviously, with the task noted in Item 3 is the intent to position ourselves for a rate revisit of users fees associated with the marinas. To do so, was to first compile the operational facility costs so that we may determine or analyze the fees. This is a work in progress understanding that our immediate chase for fee adjustments are with the GDP Facility in the form of utilities recovery as well as appropriate user fees for commercial and recreational operators.

Staff is scheduled to meet with the Department of Agriculture on June 25th to discuss potential future year grants aimed to support capital improvement of the Docks B, C & D at the Agat Marina. It is expected that the information gathered at this meeting will be incorporated into the task in progress.

As to Dock A, and as noted above internal efforts are underway to consider placing out to bid the replacement of the dock facility. I do understand that there may be some reconsideration of options however we hope not to derail the new dock effort.

OVERVIEW

1. Project Background and Description

Project Background

As mandated by the Magnuson Stevens Fishery Conservation and Management Act, the Honorable Governor of Guam submitted Guam's Marine Conservation Plan (MCP) to the Western Pacific Regional Fishery Management Council in June 2011. Contained within the Guam's MCP, the Government of Guam identified three highest priority projects and awarded the following amounts:

15	The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Accessible Fishing Platform	\$330,000
2.	Rehabilitation and Improvements to Agat Small Boat Marina Docks	\$250,000
3.	Manahak (Rabbit Fish) Hatchery and Restocking	\$150,000

At a hand-off ceremony on October 2012, representatives from WestPac presented the \$250,000 check to the Board of Directors and PAG Management. Since then, the Port Authority of Guam has deposited the check into the Port coffers pending the commencement of the project and request for reimbursements by the successful Offeror.

Project Description

Agat Small Boat Marina was built by the Army Corps of Engineers and completed in 1989. It was built to accommodate 163 vessels with shore side facilities for fuel, loading, car and trailer parking. Agat Marina is one of only two public small-boat marinas that support the approximate 5,400 boats used by the island's recreational commercial boating communities. In addition, Agat Marina was seen as a means of stimulating growth in boating activities with emphasis on fisheries, allowing improved access to fishing grounds in the south, addressing the demand for permanent dockage space, providing additional safe harbor in bad weather, and facilitating search and rescue activities for the area.

Since its completion, there has been no major infusion of capital for improvements at the Agat Marina, primarily due to insufficient funding levels from marina revenues to sustain its operations. The continued lack of suitable infrastructure and equipment has been identified as a major obstacle to the growth of Guam's commercial, recreational and charter fishing operations. According to the Guam MCP, the need to undertake major upgrades to the Agat Marina's facilities is approaching a critical point.

2. Project Scope

The Port Authority of Guam will award this project through a competitive bidding. This project is a Design-Built package. Duration for this project is Ten (10) Months from the Issuance of Notice to Proceed, beginning of the A/E Design to ending of construction and acceptance of the project by the Port Authority of Guam.

The contractor must be the prime bidder for this project or a single construction company may also bid for this project with an in-house design team that meets the PAG's requirement. PAG will not accept any bid from the A/E firm, or A/E firm in joint venture with other construction company. Bid will be lump sum cost, which will include A/E cost for the design and construction cost.

3. Discussion and Requirements

- Although federal funding is available, Based on PAG's Engineer's Estimate, \$250,000 is not sufficient to conduct a complete repair to Dock A
- Management will request \$250,000 from the Board in the next Board Meeting. After the receipt
 and review of bid packages, and based on the lowest bid, Management will request from the
 Board the balance of funds necessary for repairs, should existing grant funds indeed be
 insufficient.
- PAG needs to ensure that the docks are safe of all users, tenants, tourist and employees
- Avert PAG from potential lawsuits

Hafa adai!

I am seeking additional guidance from your office regarding the appointments to the Port Authority of Guam Board of Directors. Specifically, I would appreciate clarification on the finding contained in your Opinion dated March 26, 2013 that all current members of the board of directors are lawfully holding office in a *de jure* capacity.

You have opined that Guam law provides for staggered three (3) year terms beginning from the expiration of the initial appointments to the board. Opinion, p. 12. You then worked backwards to conclude that Christine Baleto holds office for the term of July 1, 2011 to June 30, 2014 and Mary Michelle Gibson and Daniel J. Tydingco hold their offices for the terms of July 1, 2010 to June 30, 2013. Governor Calvo has recently appointed Eduardo Ilao to hold office for the term of January 1, 2013 to December 31, 2015, resolving any uncertainty about what office he holds.

You appear to have concluded that the only remaining director, Michael Benito, holds office for the term of July 1, 2011 to June 30, 2014. Michael Benito, however, could not legally hold the office for the term of July 1, 2011 to June 30, 2014. As you have noted, a director can "serve only for the remainder of their predecessor's unexpired term." Opinion, p. 11. Benito was appointed on January 19, 2011 and confirmed on February 21, 2011. Opinion, p. 2. The term of Benito's predecessor, by your calculation, would have expired on June 30, 2011. Applying the interpretation you provided in your Opinion to the facts, Benito could have only served the remainder of his predecessor's term expiring on June 30, 2011. He could not have lawfully assumed the term from July 1, 2011 to June 30, 2014 without being reappointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Legislature.

My request is limited to whether the directors of the Port Authority of Guam have been appointed and confirmed in compliance with Guam law. Although you mentioned de facto authority in your Opinion, I do not believe that this additional analysis is necessary to resolve my request for clarification.

It is however critical that we determine with certainty that all current members of the board are sitting lawfully, in order to avoid any potential challenges to action taken. I look

RE: Request Regarding Appointments to the Port Authority of Guam Board of Directors.

On February 28, 2013, this Office received your request for intervention with respect to what you believe may be the unlawful holdover of appointments to the Port Authority of Guam Board of Directors past the expiration of their appointed terms by two board members, specifically Daniel Tydingco and Michael Benito.

FACTS

The Port Authority of Guam is a "public corporation and autonomous instrumentality of the government of Guam" 12 GCA § 10102. Its mandate is to "provide for the needs of ocean commerce, shipping, recreational and commercial boating, and navigation of the territory of Guam." *Id.* It is governed by a five member board of directors appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Legislature. Board members served staggered three year terms. Vacancies are filled "for the unexpired terms." Directors may only be removed for cause upon charges following a hearing. A quorum consists of three members of the board, and three affirmative votes are required for the transaction of all business. 12 GCA § 10103.

- (a) The Authority shall be directed by the Board which shall consist of five (5) directors appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Legislature. Directors shall be appointed and their names transmitted to the Legislature within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this Chapter. The five (5) directors first appointed shall classify themselves by lot so that their terms shall expire respectively as follows: One (1) on December 31, 1976, Two (2) on June 30, 1977 and Two (2) on June 30, 1978. Their successors shall be appointed each for a term of three (3) years to commence on the date of their confirmation by the Legislature. Any director vacancy shall be filled by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Legislature, for the unexpired term.
- (b) Any director may be removed upon charges, and after hearing, by the Governor.
- (c) Three (3) directors shall constitute a quorum of the Board and three (3) affirmative votes are required for the transaction of all business. * * *

12 GCA § 10103 (emphasis added).

By letters date January 25, 2011, Port Authority of Guam Board of Directors members Monte Mesa; Marilou Lacson; William Beery; Joseph Camacho; and Jovyna Lujan were "relieved of duty" by Governor Eddie Baza Calvo. Each of the five received the same letter which stated in its entirety:

Thank you for contributing your time, expertise, and energies towards helping the people of Guam.

By the authority vested in me as Governor of Guam, under the Organic Act of Guam, as amended, and the laws of Guam, effective immediately I hereby relieve you of your duties and responsibilities as:

Member, PORT AUTHORITY OF GUAM BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Your service to the people of Guam is greatly appreciated.

Sincerely, /s EDDIE BAZA CALVO

Based upon their original dates of confirmation by the Legislature, at the time they were "relieved of duty" from the board of directors by the Governor:

- Joseph Camacho's term had already expired;
- Monte Mesa's term of office was not due to expire until August 14, 2011;
- Marilou Lacson's term of office was not due to expire until October 3, 2011;
- William Beery's term of office was not due to expire until October 28, 2012; and
- Jovyna Lujan's term of office was not due to expire until expire November 21, 2011.

The Governor transmitted appointment letters and supporting documentation to the Legislature for the following individuals who were confirmed by the Legislature on the following dates:

- Michael T. Benito appointment transmitted January 19, 2011; confirmed February 21, 2011;
- Eduardo R. Ilao appointment transmitted January 19, 2011; confirmed February 21, 2011;²
- Daniel J. Tydingco appointment transmitted February 1, 2011 confirmed February 21, 2011;
- Mary Michelle Gibson appointment transmitted May 16, 2011; confirmed August 3, 2011; and
- Christine Baleto appointment transmitted December 6, 2011; confirmed March 16, 2012.³

¹ "Upon further consideration" by the Governor, by letter dated February 2, 2011, Jovyna Lujan's termination was "rescinded" and her three year term counting from the date of her original confirmation "reinstated" to expire November 21, 2011.

² Benito and Ilao both received letters from Governor Calvo dated January 10, 2011, notifying them that they had been appointed to the board of directors, and that their appointments were "effective immediately." However, their actual appointment letters and supporting documents were not received by the Legislature until January 19, 2011. All five of the appointment transmittal letters to the Legislature advised the Legislature that the appointments were intended for three years terms, the correctness of which is the question presented here. Nevertheless, the transmittal letters to the Legislature with supporting documentation correctly reflected that their appointments were "subject to the advice and consent of *I Liheslaturan Guāhan*."

Senator Ada posits that because Joseph Camacho's term had already expired by the time that Eduardo Ilao's name was submitted, that Ilao's confirmation on February 21, 2011 should therefore be considered as filling the first vacancy, with Ilao's new three year term to expire on February 21, 2014.⁴ Senator Ada next posits, by the order of appointment presented by the Governor and confirmed by the Legislature compared to the next two expiration dates of the "relieved" board members, that Michael Benito and Daniel Tydingco's appointments were intended to fill Monte Mesa and Marilou Lacson's unexpired terms, which had they not been "relieved of duty" would expired February 14, 2011 and February 4, 2012, respectively. According to Senator Ada's calculations, Tydingco's appointment would have expired August 14, 2011 because Tydingco should be considered to be filling Monte Mesa's unexpired term; and Benito's term would have expired on October 3, 2011 because he should be deemed to be filling the remainder of Marilou Lacson's unexpired term.⁵

If Senator Ada's calculations and interpretation of 12 GCA § 10103(a) are correct, then two of three current members of the board of directors of the Port Authority have been holding over in office without lawful authority. Unfortunately, it is at best educated guesswork to determine who that might be, as none of the Governor's appointment letters reflect that the appointments were designated to fill specific vacancies left by unexpired terms as contemplated by § 10103(a). The appointment letters simply identify the appointee and designate the term length as being submitted for three year terms. Moreover, because Ilao, Benito, and Tydingco were all three confirmed by the Legislature on the same date, January 21, 2011, there is nothing to indicate what order these three individuals were confirmed in, in order to determine which board member is intended to fill whose unexpired term. Nothing in any of the Legislature's confirmation reports suggests that anyone in the Legislature was contemplating that they were confirming limited appointments to fill unexpired terms of specific board members as provided by § 10103(a), as opposed to confirming new appointments for three year terms.

ANALYSIS

The first question to consider is whether the restrictions on the Governor's appointment authority contained in 12 GCA § 10103 are organic. Although an argument could be made that the Governor's Organic Act authority to terminate and appoint members to executive boards and agencies cannot be limited in the manner contemplated by the Legislature in § 10103 which here requires the maintenance of

³ Guam law provides, "Each Board or Commission, of which at least four (4) members are appointed by *I Maga'lahi*, shall include at least two (2) members from each gender." 4 GCA § 2105. Presumably, Mary Michelle Gibson and Christine Baleto were appointed to fill the vacancies created when Marilou Lacson and Jovyna Lujan were "relieved of duty." But there may be no way to know for certain whether either the Governor or the Legislature in fact had it in mind for Gibson and Baleto to replace Lacson and Lujan because of their sex. The constitutionality of this provision is not before us, and we express no opinion on it

⁴ For the reasons suggested in note 2, *supra*, it is unclear whether the Governor did in fact intend for Ilao to fill Camacho's vacancy.

Senator Ada calculates the unexpired terms by applying the statutory holdover provision contained in 4 GCA § 2103.9(e) ("An appointed board or commission member may continue to serve for ninety (90) calendar plus three (3) legislative days in that persons [sic] position after that persons [sic] term has expired in an acting holdover capacity until that person, or another person, is appointed by I Maga'lahen Guåhan [Governor] and confirmed by I Liheslaturan Guåhan [the Legislature].") (third and fourth bracketed parentheticals and italics in the original).

fixed, staggered terms, appointments to vacancies restricted to the remainder of unexpired terms, and the restriction on termination for cause only, it is unlikely that courts would agree. In Opinion of the Attorney General, LEG-11-0199, "Organicity of P.L. 30-190 Relating to the Appointment to the Board of Trustees of the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority" (March 28, 2011), this Office determined that although denominated a "public corporation and autonomous instrumentality" within the government of Guam, the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority ("GMHA") was in fact an executive or line agency subject to the Governor's plenary authority under Guam's Organic Act to "establish, maintain, and operate public health services in Guam, including hospitals, dispensaries, and quarantine stations, at such places in Guam as may be necessary," 48 U.S.C. § 1421g(a). Construing revisions to GMHA's statute in view of Bordallo v. Baldwin, 624 F.2d 932 (9th Cir. 1980); Nelson v. Ada, 878 F.2d 277 (9th Cir. 1989); and Sablan v. Gutierrez, 2002 Guam 13, this Office concluded that although GMHA may be described by statute as an autonomous instrumentality of the government of Guam, it is in fact not independent from the Governor's executive authority to govern its operations. Accordingly, this Office determined that the provisions of GMHA's revised statute limiting the Governor's powers of appointment and removal of GMHA's Board of Trustees were inorganic.

In Bordallo v. Baldwin, 624 F.2d 932 (9th Cir. 1980), the question presented was "whether, when the Governor is specifically charged by Section 1421g(a) of the Organic Act with the responsibility for establishing, maintaining, and operating hospitals, the Legislature may, within the terms of that act, reduce his function with respect to the governance of the Hospital to the mere ministerial function of validating the appointments made by others to the Hospital's governing body." The Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals said it could not, and rejected the Legislature's argument that Congress' inclusion of the phrase "except as otherwise provided in this chapter or the laws of Guam" in § 1422c(a), as well as inclusion of the phrase "subject to the laws of Guam" in § 1421g(a) was intended to authorize the Legislature to limit the Governor's general powers of appointment.

Defendants argue that the Governor's general appointive power as set forth in Section 1422c(a), was clearly intended to be subject to legislative action, otherwise Congress would not have included the phrase "except as otherwise provided in this chapter or the laws of Guam", and that his specific responsibility with respect to hospitals is restricted by the inclusion in Section 1421g(a) of the phrase "subject to the laws of Guam". But they failed to recognize that legislative power is limited by Section 1423a to subjects "not inconsistent with the provisions of this chapter". The legislature may, of course determine whether a hospital shall exist at all, where and how large it shall be, the size and qualifications for appointment to the governing body, and a wide variety of other matters establishing the laws of Guam "subject to" which the Governor perform his function with respect to the hospital, but it may not negate the command of the Organic Act that the ultimate responsibility for the governance of the Hospital be in the Governor. This is what it has purported to do by the disputed legislation. The Legislature has in effect, taken over the entire power to establish, maintain and operate the Hospital by dictating who the governing trustees shall be. The Governor is stripped of all power to have any voice in the policies, management or procedures of the Hospital, despite the mandate of the Organic Act to the contrary. The Legislature has exceeded its power.

Bordallo, 624 F.2d 934-35. Even though the Legislature's power is in most respects plenary, it remains constrained "by Section 1423a to subjects 'not inconsistent with the provisions of this chapter,' " id., meaning, here in particular, the separation of powers doctrine expressed in § 1421a that "[t]he government of Guam shall consist of three branches, executive, legislative and judicial."

In Nelson v. Ada, 878 F.2d 277 (9th Cir. 1989), the court held that legislation which provided that members of the school board be elected rather than appointed by the Governor violated the Organic Act, 48 U.S.C. § 1421g(b). This provision of the Organic Act provided that the "Governor shall provide an adequate public educational system of Guam, and to that end shall establish, maintain, and operate public schools at such places in Guam as may be necessary." By the time the case was heard, § 1421g(b) had been amended to require that the "Government" rather than the "Governor" shall provide an adequate public educational system. But the amendment was held to apply prospectively only, so it was still necessary to answer the question whether the Legislature's provision for an elected school board violated the Governor's executive powers of appointment. Citing Bordallo v. Baldwin as dispositive, the appeals court held that when the Legislature created an elected school board, it undermined the Governor's exclusive authority under the Organic Act to provide an adequate public educational system.

We held in Bordallo v. Baldwin that, because the governor was specifically charged by section 1421g(a) of the Organic Act with the responsibility for establishing, maintaining and operating hospitals, the legislature could not reduce his function to that of validating appointments to the Board of Trustees made by others. Id. at 934. We rejected the principal argument made by the legislature that it could enact a different process for selection, an argument similar to that made by petitioners here. That argument was that the governor's powers of appointment under the Organic Act were qualified by section 9 of the Organic Act, 48 U.S.C. § 1422c(a), which stated that the governor's power of appointment was limited and had to be exercised in accordance with the Organic Act and "the laws of Guam." We also rejected the argument that the governor's specific responsibility with respect to the hospital was restricted by the phrase in section 1421g(a) requiring that the governor exercise his authority over the public health system "subject to the laws of Guam." Id.

Nelson, 878 F.2d 279.

In Sablan v. Gutierrez, 2002 Guam 13, the Guam Supreme Court was asked to determine whether legislation which required the Governor to appoint members of the Guam Election Commission from lists of candidates provided by the two main political parties on Guam violated the Governor's appointment authority under the Organic Act. For two reasons, the Court said it did not.

Section 2101(a) [Title 3 GCA] directs the governor to appoint six members to the board of the GEC from recommendations made by the recognized political parties of Guam. The Governor failed to appoint any of the three persons recommended by the Republican party. The lower court held that the Governor's failure to name the Republican nominees to the GEC board violated section 2101(a). The lower court's decision rested on two alternative grounds. First, the board of the GEC is not a part of the executive branch, and thereby not within the Governor's power of appointment as conferred by the Organic Act. Second, even assuming the GEC is an executive agency, the power of appointment is not exclusive to the Governor and can be limited by the legislature.

Sablan, 2002 Guam 13 ¶ 3. The Guam Election Commission is designated by law as "an autonomous instrumentality and an independent commission of the government of Guam." 3 GCA § 2101(a). Without deciding the Commission's status as either executive or autonomous, the Supreme Court assumed for purposes of decision that the Commission was an executive agency and proceeded to analyze whether limitations placed on the Governor's appointment authority were inorganic.

Although section 2101(a) does not completely divest the Governor of his discretion in appointing the members of the GEC, it does place a limitation on his power of appointment by restricting his group of candidates to persons recommended by Guam's recognized political parties. Therefore, we must address the Governor's argument that any limitation placed on his power of appointment violates the Organic Act. The Governor's appointment authority is limited and set forth in 48 U.S.C. § 1422, which states that the Governor "shall appoint, and may remove, all officers and employees of the executive branch of the government of Guam, except as otherwise provided in this or any other Act of Congress, or under the laws of Guam...."48 U.S.C. § 1422 (1950). Assuming arguendo that the GEC is an executive agency, the phrase "except as otherwise provided ... under the law" is an "unmistakable recognition of the authority of the lawmaking department to provide for the appointment of all officers whose appointment is not definitely regulated by the Constitution itself." Driscoll v. Sakin, 121 N.J.L. 225, 1 A.2d 881, 882 (N.J.1938).

Id., 2002 Guam 13 ¶ 13 (editorial ellipsis by the Court). The Court distinguished the Governor's statutory responsibilities with respect to appointments to the Election Commission from his Organic Act authority with respect to Guam's public hospital discussed in Bordallo, and the board of Guam's public school system addressed in Nelson. The fact that the source of the Governor's responsibility with respect to governance of the public hospital and public schools was found in the Organic Act was dispositive of the question whether the Legislature can limit the Governor's power of appointment and removal.

Unlike the facts presented in Bordallo v. Baldwin, 624 F.2d 932 (9th Cir.1980), and Nelson v. Ada, 878 F.2d 277 (9th Cir.1989), no other provision within the Organic Act limits the manner in which the legislature may restrict the power of appointment with respect to the GEC. See Bordallo, 624 F.2d at 934-35 (finding that a statute rendering the Governor's power to appoint hospital trustees ministerial conflicted with the provision of the Organic Act that vested the Governor with authority to maintain Guam's health services); see also Nelson, 878 F.2d at 279-80 (finding that a statute divesting the Governor of his power to appoint school board members conflicted with the provision of the Organic Act that vested the Governor with authority to maintain Guam's public school system). Therefore, section 2101(a) is a legitimate exercise by the legislature of its express authority to determine how the members of a board it created are to be selected and appointed. See Welch v. Key, 365 P.2d 154, 157 (Okla.1961).

Id., 2002 Guam 13 ¶ 14. Because the Legislature's authority with respect to the Election Commission was not constrained by the Organic Act in the way it was (and is) with respect to the hospital and formerly was with respect to public schools, the Supreme Court found that requiring the Governor to select his appointees to the Guam Election Commission from lists provided by each of the recognized political parties on Guam was a reasonable limitation on the Governor's appointment authority and was not in conflict with the Organic Act. The Court said, "Therefore, we find that the legislature can restrict the Governor's selection and appointment of the GEC board members to persons recommended by Guam's recognized political parties without being inconsistent with the Organic Act." Id., 2002 Guam 13 ¶ 16 (citation omitted).

Unlike the Governor's authority with respect to Guam's public hospital and at one time public schools, there is no comparable mandate to be found in the Organic Act with respect to the Port Authority of Guam. And although there is no case squarely on point with respect to either the Port Authority or the A.B. Won Pat Guam International Airport Authority, the courts continue to distinguish between public corporations and autonomous agencies that are not subject to the Governor's plenary authority under the

Organic Act, see, e.g., Guam Radio Services, Inc. v. Guam Economic Development Authority, 2000 Guam 1; Bordallo v. Reyes, 763 F.2d 1098 (9th Cir. 1985), affirming Bordallo v. Reyes, 610 F.Supp. 1128 (D. Guam 1984); and Laguana v. Guam Visitor's Bureau, 725 F.2d 519 (9th Cir. 1984), and those executive agencies which are subject to the Governor's plenary authority under the Organic Act, see again, Bordallo v. Baldwin and Nelson v. Ada. Accordingly, and unlike the revisions to Guam Memorial Hospital Authority's enabling legislation considered in Opinion of the Attorney General, LEG-11-0199, "Organicity of P.L. 30-190 Relating to the Appointment to the Board of Trustees of the Guam Memorial Hospital Authority," this Office can discern no Organic Act infirmity in 12 GCA § 10103(a).

It is now necessary to determine precisely what the Legislature intended with respect to the terms of office of the Port Authority's Board of Directors created by 12 GCA § 10103.

Statutory interpretation always begins with the language of the statute. Aguon v. Gutierrez, 2002 Guam 14 ¶ 6. "In cases involving statutory construction, the plain language of a statute must be the starting point." Bank of Guam v. Guam Banking Bd., 2003 Guam 9 ¶ 19. When the plain reading of a statute is "clear on its face" and yields to an unambiguous definition, we will not look past that plain reading. Castino [v. G.C. Corp.], 2010 Guam 3 ¶ 29, 30 ("A plain reading construction is appropriate where the statute lays out specific requirements and indicates exactly what is necessary for compliance without ambiguous terms."). However, if the text of the statute is ambiguous or results in absurd or unworkable consequences, the "fair and reasonable" construction is applied. Id. ¶ 58 (internal quotation marks omitted); see also Manvil Corp. v. E.C. Gozum & Co., Inc., 1998 Guam 20 ¶ 17 ("We adopt a fair and reasonable construction and application of our mechanics' lien statutes to the facts in each particular case, so as to afford materialmen and laborers the security intended by the legislation's remedial purpose. Where the statutes are clear on their face, however, we will not read further."). When examining the statute's language, the court must consider whether the language is "plain and unambiguous," which is determined by "reference to the language itself, the specific context in which that language is used, and the broader context of the statute as a whole." Aguon, 2002 Guam 14 ¶ 6 (quoting Robinson v. Shell Oil Co., 519 U.S. 337, 340 (1997)); see also Macris v. Guam Mem'l Hosp. Auth., 2008 Guam 6 ¶ 19 (quoting Aguon, 2002 Guam 14 ¶ 9) (stating that a statute "'must be examined within its context,' which 'includes looking at other provisions of the same statute and other related statutes' ").

Guam Resorts, Inc. v. G.C. Corp., 2012 Guam 13 ¶ 7.

A plain reading of the Port Authority's enabling legislation informs the reader that the Legislature intended (1) that individual members of the Port Authority's board of directors shall serve fixed three years terms; (2) that following the appointment of the Port Authority's first board of directors, board members' terms of office end on specific calendar dates; (3) that vacancies in office are to be filled by appointment and legislative confirmation, but limited to the remainder of the appointee's predecessor's unexpired term; and (4) that directors may only be removed by the Governor "upon charges," or for cause. These are all common characteristics of independent or "autonomous" agencies that distinguish them from executive agencies subject to the chief executive's plenary authority. See, Lisa Schultz Bressman, Procedures as Politics in Administrative Law, 107 Colum.L.Rev. 1749, 1806 (Dec. 2007) ("Independent agencies have features that affect political control, including limits on plenary presidential removal, bipartisan membership requirements, and fixed and staggered terms. Each prevents agency policy from shifting dramatically with new administrations, although the President still may influence policy by, for example, choosing a new commission chair.") (footnotes omitted); Lisa Schultz Bressman and Robert B. Thompson, The Future of Agency Independence, 63 Vand.L.Rev. 599, 610 (Apr. 2010) ("[I]Independent

agencies are different in structure because the President lacks authority to remove their heads from office except for cause. Thus, these agencies are independent in the sense that the President cannot fire their leaders for political reasons and, consequently, cannot use this ultimate sanction to back up particular policy recommendations. [¶] Independent agencies have other structural features that distinguish them from executive-branch agencies. They are generally run by multi-member commissions or boards, whose members serve fixed, staggered terms, rather than a cabinet secretary or single administrator who serves at the pleasure of the President and thus will likely depart with a change of administration, if not before.") (footnotes omitted); id, 63 Vand.L.Rev. 611 ("At the broadest level, the structural characteristics of independent agencies are aimed at insulating them, to some degree, from politics.") (footnote omitted); see also, Peter L. Strauss, The Place of Agencies in Government: Separation of Powers and the Fourth Branch, 84 Colum. L. Rev. 573, 609-16 (Apr. 1984).

In Marbury v. Madison, 5 U.S. (1 Cranch) 137 (1803), the Supreme Court of the United States held, "Where an officer is removable at the will of the executive, the circumstance which completes his appointment is of no concern; because the act is at any time revocable; and the commission may be arrested, if still in the office. But when the officer is not removable at the will of the executive, the appointment is not revocable, and cannot be annulled. It has conferred legal rights which cannot be resumed. In The discretion of the executive is to be exercised until the appointment has been made. But having once made the appointment, his power over the office is terminated in all cases, where, by law, the officer is not removable by him." Id., 5 U.S. at 163. In United States v. Perkins, 116 U.S. 483, 485 (1886), the Court held, "We have no doubt that when congress, by law, vests the appointment of inferior officers in the heads of departments, it may limit and restrict the power of removal as it deems best for the public interest. The constitutional authority in congress to thus vest the appointment implies authority to limit, restrict, and regulate the removal by such laws as congress may enact in relation to the officers so appointed. The head of a department has no constitutional prerogative of appointment to offices independently of the legislation of congress, and by such legislation he must be governed, not only in making appointments, but in all that is incident thereto." And in Myers v. United States, 272 U.S. 52, 126 (1926), the Supreme Court stated that "[i]n the absence of any specific provision to the contrary, the power of appointment to executive office carries with it, as a necessary incident, the power of removal."

By contrast, in Humphrey's Executor v. United States, 295 U.S. 602, 631-32 (1935), the Court held, "Whether the power of the President to remove an officer shall prevail over the authority of Congress to condition the power by fixing a definite term and precluding a removal except for cause will depend upon the character of the office; the Myers decision, affirming the power of the President alone to make the removal, is confined to purely executive officers; and as to officers of the kind here under consideration, we hold that no removal can be made during the prescribed term for which the officer is appointed, except for one or more of the causes named in the applicable statute." And in Wiener v. United States, 357 U.S. 349 (1958), explaining its holding in Humphrey's Executor, the Court said that it "drew a sharp line of cleavage between officials who were part of the Executive establishment and were thus removable by virtue of the President's constitutional powers, and those who are members of a body 'to exercise its judgment without the leave or hindrance of any other official or any department of the government,' as to whom a power of removal exists only if Congress may fairly be said to have conferred it. This sharp differentiation derives from the difference in functions between those who are part of the Executive establishment and those whose tasks require absolute freedom from Executive interference."

Id., 357 U.S. 556 (citation omitted).

In particular, fixed, staggered terms, and limitations proscribing removal except for cause are intended not merely to promote stability and continuity of institutional knowledge, but to insulate autonomous agencies from the political influence from the appointing authority. Compare, United States v. Wilson, 290 F.3d 347, 359 (D.C. Cir. 2002) ("Thus it is evident that in staggering the membership

(among other features), Congress was insulating the Commission from carte blanc replacement at any given time."); Watson v. Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission, 386 Pa. 117, 125, 125 A.2d 354, 357 (Pa. 1956) ("The purpose of the foregoing provision as to the terms of office of the Commissioners (i. e., those first to be appointed and thereafter their successors) is patent. It was designed so that, by the prescribed rotation, the terms of three of the four appointed members of the Commission would always be current ... Were the Commissioners to be held removable at the pleasure of the Governor, the carefully expressed scheme of term rotation would be effectually nullified."); Bowers v. Pennsylvania Labor Relations Board, 402 Pa. 542, 551, 167 A.2d 480, 484 (Pa. 1961) ("The legislature has shown that, when it creates an administrative agency and provides that its members shall be appointed for fixed terms with staggered expiration dates, the intent thereby evidenced is that such members are not removable by the appointor at his pleasure."); Patterson v. DeCarbo, 46 Pa,D&C.4th 148, 162 (Pa,Com,Pl, 2000) ("In conclusion, the standard for removing an appointed official from a legislatively created public office, as it evolved from a long history of Pennsylvania Supreme Court case law, is that the inclusion of a method of removal of the appointed officer in the pertinent legislation, by either providing for staggered fixed terms of appointment or a specific mode of removing the official prior to the expiration of his term, indicates a legislative intent that ... the official may not be removed at the pleasure of the appointing authority."); Board of Supervisors of Prince William County v. Wood, 213 Va. 545, 548, 193 S.E.2d 671, 674 (Va. 1973) ("All these statutes, nevertheless, evince a continuing legislative interest in cushioning the shock to the public school system from sudden changes in local government. Staggered terms afford some continuity in the operation of school boards. But the continuity is subject to abrupt disruption if the appointing body may at will replace an entire board..."); Jackson v. Hubbard, 256 Ala. 114, 120, 53 So.2d 723, 728 (Ala. 1951) ("The change made by the legislature in 1943, providing for staggered terms, seems to us to indicate a clear legislative intent to make free from any doubt the permanency and independence of the status of the members of the board of directors."); In re Sedacca v Mangano, 18 N.Y.3d 609, 615-16, 965 N.E.2d 257, 260, 942 N.Y.S.2d 30, 33 (N.Y. 2012) ("This design may frustrate the most recent expression of the electorate's mandate, but it is meant precisely to avoid a wholesale change of membership of the ARC upon the installation of each successive administration...Removing the commissioners without cause under Nassau County Charter § 203, as respondents urge, would frustrate the legislative intent by nullifying the requirements of the RPTL and rendering the staggered statutory terms of office in RPTL 523-b superfluous.").

As described by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, it is of no small consequence when the Governor usurps the prerogative of the Legislature by purporting to exercise a power not reserved to him in the Constitution, or in the case of Guam its Organic Act.

It is implicit in the American form of government, as ordained by the Constitution of both the United States and Pennsylvania, that the government consist[s] of three coordinate branches, legislative, executive and judicial, and that one branch should not impinge on the province of another. Any interference by a member of the executive department of government with the tenure of an incumbent member of a quasijudicial board or commission would plainly offend against this basic constitutional concept. The Supreme Court has twice declared that the President of the United States lacks power to remove without cause an appointed member of an administrative agency which possesses and exercises judicial powers. Wiener v. United States, 1958, 357 U.S. 349, 352, 78 S.Ct. 1275, 2 L.Ed.2d 1377; Humphrey's Executor v. United States, 1935, 295 U.S. 602, 627-628, 55 S.Ct. 869, 79 L.Ed. 1611. For the same reasons, the Governor of Pennsylvania may not remove without cause an appointee to an administrative board or commission which, as authorized by law, is invested with judicial powers and duties. Nor is it of presently material significance that the Constitution of the United States, under which the cases above cited arose, does not contain a provision such as Article VI,

Section 4, of the Pennsylvania Constitution. The controlling governmental principle of a division of powers among equal and independent legislative, executive and judicial departments, with the attendant salutary checks and balances, inheres in, and is the essence of, both our Federal and State Constitutions.

Bowers v. Pennsylvania Labor Relations Board, 402 Pa. 542, 552-53, 167 A.2d 480, 484-85 (Pa. 1961).

Having determined that the Port Authority's statute suffers no facial Organic Act infirmity that would prevent the Legislature from creating a "public corporation and autonomous instrumentality of the government of Guam" whose directors hold office by staggered, fixed terms, and who can only be removed for cause, the conclusion is inescapable that the Governor was without authority to "relieve" the former members of their offices on board of directors. Had any of those members who still had unexpired terms challenged their removal from office it is more than likely that the courts of Guam would be compelled to order their return to office to fill the remainder of their terms. But none challenged their removal from office prior to the expiration of their terms, and the Legislature having confirmed their successors without question, that matter is now moot.

The next question is whether vacancies on the board of directors may only be filled for the remainder of the officeholders' unexpired terms, or whether an argument can be made that the new appointees began new three year terms from the date of their confirmation by the Legislature. For all that appears, the Legislature failed to consider whether they were confirming appointments to fill the remainder of unexpired terms, but simply assumed that appointments were being confirmed for new three year terms. However, the fact that the Governor and the Legislature may have unwittingly given the appointees and the public the impression that directors had been confirmed to serve new three year terms commencing on the date of their confirmation is not dispositive. "The appointment and the commission are distinct acts, and the terms of the commission cannot change the effect of the appointment as defined by the statute." Quackenbush v. United States, 177 U.S. 20, 27 (1900). Thus, it does not matter what the Governor's appointment and transmittal letters said with respect to the effective date or the length of the appointees' terms, nor does it matter what the Legislature did or did not say in its notices of confirmation as to when any particular board members' terms began and ended. What matters is what the law says.

Any construction of the Port Authority's enabling statute that suggests that when a vacancy on the board of directors occurs prior to the expiration of their fixed three year term, the Governor is permitted to make an appointment that commences a new three year term would render the phrase "[a]ny director vacancy shall be filled by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Legislature, for the unexpired term" superfluous, a nullity. "As a rule of statutory construction, a statute should be construed in such a way that 'no clause, sentence, or word shall be superfluous, void, or insignificant." Guam Resorts, Inc. v. G.C. Corp., 2012 Guam 13 ¶ 15 (quoting Duncan v. Walker, 533 U.S. 167, 174 (2001)). "A statute should be construed to give effect to all of its provisions so that no part would be superfluous or insignificant." Macris v. Richardson, 2010 Guam 6 ¶ 15 (citations omitted); accord, Sablan v. Guam Land Use Com'n, 2011 Guam 29 ¶ 19. Therefore, in order to "give effect to all of its provisions so that no part would be superfluous or insignificant," the members of the Port Authority's current board of directors who were confirmed following vacancies left unexpired terms, ordinarily due to death or

⁶ We note that another provision of Guam law applicable to vacancies in office separately provides, "Whenever a vacancy occurs in any office the term of which is fixed by law, such vacancy shall be filled as provided by law for the balance of the unexpired term thereof." 4 GCA § 2102.

voluntary resignation, serve only for the remainder of their predecessor's unexpired term. In order to answer the question when those terms begin and end, we return to the statute.

Title 12 GCA § 10103(a) again provides,

The Authority shall be directed by the Board which shall consist of five (5) directors appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Legislature. Directors shall be appointed and their names transmitted to the Legislature within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this Chapter. The five (5) directors first appointed shall classify themselves by lot so that their terms shall expire respectively as follows: One (1) on December 31, 1976, Two (2) on June 30, 1977 and Two (2) on June 30, 1978. Their successors shall be appointed each for a term of three (3) years to commence on the date of their confirmation by the Legislature.

As discussed previously, the first sentence of § 10103(a) evidences the Legislature's intent to establish staggered terms for the Port Authority board of directors, a common enough attribute among autonomous agencies, intended to promote continuity in governance and to insulate autonomous agencies from political interference by the appointing authority and his or her successor.

Senator Ada interprets the phrase, "to commence on the date of their confirmation by the Legislature" to mean that directors' three year terms begin on the date they were confirmed. On its face

⁷ Although inapplicable to the facts before us, the practice of requesting "courtesy" resignations is expressly disallowed under Guam law. See 4 GCA § 2103.7 ("The practice of requiring or submitting undated resignations to be accepted at a later date by the appointing authority or any other person is hereby declared to be contrary to public policy for any position within the government of Guam. Neither the Governor of Guam nor any other person may request an undated resignation letter or courtesy resignation from any officer or employee of the government of Guam, whether or not the position held by such person is subject to the advice and consent of the Legislature; and no officer or employee of the government of Guam shall submit such an undated resignation letter, and any such undated courtesy resignation letter submitted in violation of this section shall be void.").

⁸ Compare, Romanoff v. State Com'n on Judicial Performance, 126 P.3d 182, 191 (Colo. 2006) ("The plain language of subsection (1)(b) indicates that when a commissioner is appointed to fill an unexpired term, he or she serves the remainder of that term."); United States v. Wilson, 290 F.3d 347, 355 (D.C. Cir. 2002) ("Staggered terms must run with the calendar, rather than with the person, to preserve staggering. Thus, taken with the history and background against which Congress was legislating ... it simply makes more sense to read § 1975(c) as creating terms of office running with the calendar from the date of expiration of a predecessor's term. That being the case, any appointment to fill a vacancy for an unexpired term, such as Ms. Wilson's appointment, must only be for the duration of that unexpired term.").

⁹ We note that the phrase "to commence on the date of their confirmation by the Legislature" found in the Port Authority's enabling act is nowhere else to be found in the Guam Code Annotated. The members of the A.B. Won Pat Guam International Authority's board of directors do not serve staggered terms. See, e.g., 12 GCA § 1106(a) ("All powers vested in the Authority, except as provided herein, shall be exercised by the Board, which shall consist of seven (7) members, called directors, who shall be nominated and appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislature. Each director shall serve a term of three (3) years from the expiration of the term for which such director's predecessor was appointed, and until a successor is appointed and qualified, or in the case of a director

that is a perfectly reasonable interpretation, one that may even be shared by the rest of the Legislature and by prior administrations. But to sustain the construction of the sentence in that way would require it to be viewed in isolation from the preceding sentence. This would allow either the Governor or the Legislature to control and de-stagger board members' dates of service by delaying appointment or confirmation. And that would too easily destabilize the continuity of governance and insulation from politics the Legislature originally intended when it established date-specific staggered terms. 10 In our opinion neither Senator Ada nor Governor Calvo's construction of the statute is correct. Rather, and in order that the "statute should be construed to give effect to all of its provisions so that no part would be superfluous or insignificant," Macris, 2010 Guam 6 ¶ 15, the better reasoned view, consistent with the purpose and practice of staggered terms found elsewhere in the Guam Code and throughout the nation, is that staggered three year terms cycle by calendar date beginning from the expiration of the initial appointments to the board originally established by the Legislature: one on December 31, 1976; two on June 30, 1977 and two on June 30, 1978. Cycling through the calendar to present day, focusing on the terms of office defined by calendar date in order to effectuate the Legislature's original intent as opposed to the date of confirmation of any particular board member's predecessor, the resulting terms of office are as follows: the first term commences January 1, 2010 and ends December 31, 2012; the second and third terms commence July 1. 2010 and end June 30, 2013; and the fourth and fifth terms commence on July 1, 2011 and end June 30, 2014.¹¹

What remains then is to determine which members of the current board are holding which terms of office. Working backwards from the most recently confirmed board members to the first, we find that Christine Baleto holds the office of director for the term July 1, 2011 to June 30, 2014; and Mary Michelle Gibson and Daniel J. Tydingco hold the offices for the terms July 1, 2010 to June 30, 2013. We believe Tydingco holds office for this particular term because although he was confirmed on the same

appointed to a newly created membership in the Board, such director shall serve a term of three (3) years from the date of initial appointment, and until a successor is appointed and qualified.").

Compare, United States v. Wilson, 290 F.3d 347, 360-61 (D.C. Cir. 2002) ("Finally, we observe that our interpretation, unlike that urged by appellees, avoids anomalous results. As noted above, the creation of staggered terms was one of several structural features adopted in the 1983 Act to establish the Commission as an independent, bipartisan entity, to insulate it from political influence, and to protect its integrity and credibility. The district court contended that its decision would not result in "the complete elimination of all staggering," but acknowledged that its decision would result in the 'absence of uniformly staggered terms.' The district court further contended that 'there is little, if any, substantive difference between those two.' We disagree. There is a substantial difference in having predictable terms ensuring that membership will turn over in a periodic and foreseeable manner, and having unpredictable vacancies that permanently disorder member terms. Not the least difference is the diffusion of appointment authority across presidential administrations. Moreover, there is no apparent reason Congress would originally create fixed, staggered terms, as it did under the 1983 Act, only to have them become unpredictably de-staggered over time as some members of the Commission resign, retire, are removed, or die.").

We do not believe that this interpretation, which it may be argued tends to minimize the emphasis on the phrase "to commence on the date of their confirmation," runs afoul of the rule that "[a] statute should be construed to give effect to all of its provisions so that no part would be superfluous or insignificant." *Macris*, 2010 Guam 6 ¶ 15. Rather, viewing the paragraph as a whole the purpose of the phrase "to commence on the date of their confirmation" is to emphasize that — when filling vacancies created prematurely before the expiration of a director's term — "acting" directors are not authorized, and that the "advice and consent of the Legislature" is still required, *before* they may commence their service.

date as Michael Benito and Eduardo Ilao, Tydingco's appointment letter to the Legislature was submitted later in time, making his the more recent submission of the three. What we cannot ascertain with certainty is which seat on the board of directors belongs to Benito and which seat belongs to Ilao. ¹² Nevertheless, it is the considered opinion of this Office that the current members of the Port Authority's board of directors are all, at this time, holding office in a *de jure* capacity. ¹³

Conclusion

We summarize our opinion as follows: First, the limitations on the Governor's appointment and removal authority imposed by 12 GCA § 10103(a) — which provides for fixed, staggered terms for the board of directors and further provides that directors may only be removed for cause — is a lawful exercise of the Legislature's authority under Guam's Organic Act. Second, the Governor's removal of the former members of the Board of Directors was not authorized by the Organic Act; however, the former directors' failure to challenge their removal prior to the expiration of their terms and confirmation of their successors by the Legislature renders that question moot. Third, in order to effectuate the Legislature's original intent when it established fixed and staggered terms and provided that directors may only be removed for cause, the purpose of which is to provide continuity in the governance of the Port Authority and to insulate the directors from political interference, the rules of statutory construction require the conclusion that terms begin and end based on fixed calendar dates. Fourth, the current members of the board of directors are lawfully holding office in a de jure capacity.

¹² As noted earlier in this opinion, the Governor having "relieved of duty" the former board members without Organic Act authority there is no contemporaneous evidence reflecting his intent at the time of his first three appointments as to which vacancies he intended to fill. He was, of course, without the benefit of this opinion at that time. Factoring in 4 GCA § 2103.9(e), either Ilao or Benito's term formally expired on December 31, 2012, in which case whoever it may be is permitted to serve in a *de jure* holdover capacity for ninety (90) calendar plus three (3) legislative days, and the other director's term will expire June 30, 2013 plus, if necessary, an additional ninety (90) calendar plus three (3) legislative days. We anticipate that Governor Calvo and future governors will be specific in their future transmittals as to which term of office is being filled.

¹³ Because the current members of the board of directors are holding office *de jure*, it is unnecessary to discuss the *de facto* officer doctrine adopted with approval by the Guam Supreme Court in *Gutierrez v. Guam Election Com'n*, 2011 Guam 3 ¶ 54-73.
