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**MINUTES OF THE  
REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS  
Thursday, August 17, 2017**

**I. CALL TO ORDER**

There being a quorum, the regular meeting of the Board of Directors was called to order at 11:55 a.m., Thursday, August 17, 2017. Present at the meeting were:

**II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

a. **July 13, 2017 – Regular Board Meeting:** Director Taitano made motion to approve the minutes of July 13, 2017 subject to correction. The motion was seconded by the Vice Chairman and was unanimously passed.

**III. PUBLIC COMMENTS**

- a. **Public Comments:** None.
- b. **Employee Comments:** None.
- c. **PAGGMA Association:** PAGGMA President Steve Muna mentioned that September 3, 2017 is the Labor Day Picnic and all is invited.

**IV. GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT**

The General Manager's report was provided for Board's information. The following key item(s) are noted as follows:

1. **Port Authority Float wins 1<sup>st</sup> Place a 73<sup>rd</sup> Liberation Day Parade:** The Port Authority of Guam placed 1<sup>st</sup> in the Government of Guam category for the 73<sup>rd</sup> Liberation Day Parade. The design of the Port's float paid tribute to the theme "Strength in Unity – *Manmetgot gi Dinanña*’."

2. **Court Decision and Order (Defendant's Motion for Stay Pending Appeal):** Superior Court Judge Anita Sukola on July 31, 2017 granted the Port's motion for Stay pending appeal to the Supreme Court of Guam in the case of PAG vs Guam YTK.

3. **Introduction of Bill No. 157-34 Relative to Bond Legislation:** The Port's bond initiative through Bill No. 157-34 was introduced on August 2, 2017. The Board will be advised once a public hearing date is scheduled.

4. **Port of Guam still Designated as a Strategic Seaport with a Special Consideration Status:** The Port recently received clarification that it remains a 'strategic seaport' identified under 'special consideration'. The special designation eliminates the need for port planning orders, a port readiness committee, readiness reporting, and ports for national defense study updates for Port of Guam.

5. **Arrival of New Forklifts:** The Port's new forklifts arrived on August 7, 2017 which is one 20-ton and three 10-tons. The equipment is currently being serviced and prepared for operations by Morrico and is anticipated to be turned over to the Port the end of this week. The Port is still awaiting the arrival order of four additional 5-ton forklifts.

6. **Removal of Mobile Harbor Crane Boom:** The Port's contractor, Smithbridge, removed the boom from the Mobile Harbor Crane on August 5-6, 2017. The MHC has since been non-operational and posed a safety hazard, especially during inclement weathers.

7. **Port's Participation in 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter Island-Wide Beautification Project:** Port employees volunteered in the island-wide beautification project on July 29, 2017 in the Ironwood Housing area off of Chalan Lumasu in the village of Dededo.

8. **Adopt-A-School Program:** The Port takes part every year in the adopt-a-school program. Port maintenance and transportation divisions provided assistance to JP Torres Elementary School and Southern High School.

9. **Hagatna Marina Fishing:** Management reported the concerns raised in the harvesting of fish at the Hagatna marina. The Chairman commented that seasonal fishing has always been a discussion which is this time of year. He recalled that fishing activity is allowed at the boat basin so long as the boats/vessels are able to traverse through the navigational channel. Mr. Felix R. Pangelinan, Deputy General Manager of Operations (DGMO) remembered that the discussion back then that allowed for harvesting of fish at a designated area in the Hagatna marina was a result of finding a compromise for the anglers and netters. However, he said the marina rules and regulations prohibit any net fishing activity in the marina (*Marina* as defined in Rule 2.16). The DGMO mentioned that until such time the law is amended,

appropriately initiated by the anglers or netters, enforcement needs to be made. The General Manager said back in August 2012, previous management attempted to work resolution with Department of Agriculture in defining a designated fishing area for the netters, which in June 2013 Department of Agriculture had agreed. She mentioned that while this was an agreement made in the past moving forward, she expressed concern on the authority to do so. The General Manager said according to 5 GCA, Chapter 63, Section 63116 Taking of Fish, netting would not be legal at this time. Director Mendiola mentioned that while there exist prohibition on net fishing and in addressing the concern raised by anglers, she felt that the islands culture should be respected as well, especially since harvesting fish is a livelihood of others. Director Mendiola suggested that perhaps management look into other alternatives as it appears the Port's angle is to encourage navigational safety, and at the same time making the marina facility available for use. The General Manager mentioned that management will further research this issue and meet with Department of Agriculture, but as it stands, the law will be properly enforced.

## **V. OLD BUSINESS**

There were no old business discussed.

## **VI. NEW BUSINESS**

1. **2017 AAPA Annual Membership Meeting:** The General Manager mentioned that AAPA annual membership meeting will take place on October 2017 during the annual convention. She said in order to cast a vote in the membership meeting the Board would need to appoint an official designee. Director Taitano made motion to appoint Chairman of the Board Francisco G. Santos as the official designee for the AAPA annual membership meeting. Motion was seconded by the Vice Chairman and was unanimously approved.

2. **Legal Professional Services:** Mr. Alfred F. Duenas, Deputy General Manager of Admin/Finance (DGMA) mentioned that in review of the legal billings for the month June and July 2017, revealed that such billing has exceeded the threshold of the contract. In accordance with the Professional Services Agreement for legal representation, Section III Compensation, the consultant's monthly billings shall not exceed the sum of \$70,000.00 per month without prior written approval or subsequent ratification by the Port Board of Directors. June billing has a variance of \$3,438.37 and \$22,781.25 variance for July billing. As such, management requests for Board ratification of the difference in legal invoices for the months of June and July 2017. Additionally, request is also being made to transfer the sum of \$21,000.00 from the Equipment Rental account to Legal Service account to cover the shortfall.

Director Mendiola made motion to ratify the variance in legal services for the month of June at \$3,438.37 and July at \$22,781.25, seconded by Director Taimanglo. Motion was unanimously approved.

Director Taitano made motion to authorize the budget transfer of \$21,000.00 from the Equipment Rental account to Legal Service account to cover the shortfall. Motion was seconded by Director Taimanglo and was unanimously approved.

3. **Fiscal Year 2018 Budget:** Director Taimanglo made motion to approve the Fiscal Year 2018 Budget as presented, seconded by Director Mendiola. Motion was unanimously approved.

4. **Position Conversion of Winch Operator:** The DGMO requested for Board's approval to convert the position of winch operator to a regular stevedore position. He said the winch operator position was recently vacated by an employee that has since retired. The DGMO said the Port has met the needs of the winch operator positions for its six gang operation, but lacks a regular stevedore to complete the requirement per gang. Director Taitano made motion to convert the position of Winch Operator to a regular Stevedore position, seconded by the Vice Chairman. Motion was unanimously approved.

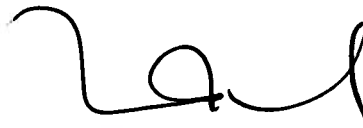

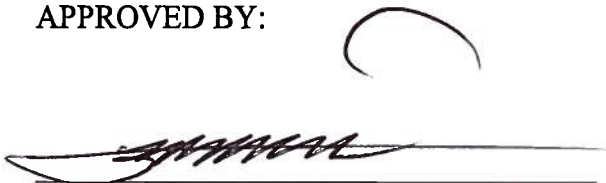
## VII. ADJOURNMENT

**Public Hearing for Bill No. 157-34**

On Tuesday, September 19, 2017, a Public Hearing was held by Speaker Benjamin Cruz and his Committee on Appropriations and Adjudication on Bill No. 157-34 (COR) "An Act to Repeal and Reenact Article 2 of Chapter 10, Title 12, Guam Code Annotated, Relative to Authorizing Jose D. Leon Guerrero Commercial Port to Issue Revenue Bonds and Other Indebtedness for the Purposes of Financing or Refinancing Improvements and/or Working Capital Relating to the Jose D. Leon Guerrero Commercial Port and other Related Facilities and Operations of the Jose D. Leon Guerrero Commercial Port; and Approving the Terms and Conditions of the Issuance of One or More Series of Such Bonds Pursuant to Such Article for Such Purposes."

Board Chairman Frank Santos provided opening remarks on behalf of the Port and thanked Speaker Cruz for scheduling the hearing on Bill No. 157-34. The GM provided written testimony and informed the Speaker and his committee that as a number of the points related in her written testimony were included in the Port's slide presentation, she would defer to the Port's Division Managers to provide their presentation to the committee and then be available to respond to any question or comments the committee may have. Acting Chief Planner Joe Javellana provided the presentation on the "Renovation of Hotel Wharf." He was followed Commercial Manager Glenn Nelson who presented the "Construction of the Administration Building and Commercial Center. The next topic presented was on the "Replacement and Relocation of Waterlines" that was provided by Operations Manager John Santos. The next presentation was the "Repair of EQMR & Warehouse 1 was provided by Maintenance Manager Ernie Candoleta who was followed by Engineer Manager Simeon Delos Santos on the topic "Repair of Golf Pier." The final slide presentation was provided by Deputy GM for Administration and Finance Alfred Duenas on the "Bond-Funded Capital Improvement Projects."



At the conclusion of the Port's presentation, a number of Port staff and representatives from APL provided testimony in favor of the bill in addition to other public testimony. Port management was then called up to respond to questions related to the proposed legislation. The hearing lasted for close to four hours.

On Wednesday, September 20, 2017, the Port received a list of ten questions from Speaker Cruz's office relating to additional estimated cost for the EQMR Building and Warehouse 1, estimated cost for the rehabilitation of the F-1 Fuel Pier, updated financials based on present market conditions, calculation and rationale for the savings related to loans intended to be refunded, cost-benefit analysis on the proposed new Administration Building, replacement of Gantry 3, and if the Port would be submitting a new tariff to the PUC relating to capital improvement projects authorized by the legislature and the maximum allowed borrowing interest rate and terms. Port management and staff are currently working on responding to these additional questions.

## **PUC Meeting on PAG Docket 16-01, Complaint by Cementon Micronesia**

On Thursday, August 31, 2017 the Public Utilities Commission PUC held a regular Business for PAG Docket 16-01, Complaint by Cementon Micronesia LLC, ALJ Report, and Proposed Order. During this meeting the Commission made a decision to move this matter to Thursday, September 14, 2017 to provide the opportunity for the Commission Members to further review the draft decision.

Earlier in the year as previously reported to the Board, a Merit Hearing was held by Administrative Law Judge Joephet Alcantara on April 19-20, 2017. Cementon had argued that it should not be required to pay wharfage fees since its competitor Hansen was not required to pay wharfage fees to the Port. On Wednesday, August 30, 2017, the ALJ Report on the hearing was filed relating to the Cementon complaint.

On Thursday, September 14, 2017, the GM, Deputy GM for Administration and Finance Alfred Duenas, Deputy GM for Operations Felix Pangelinan and Port Counsel Mike Phillips were in attendance. During this meeting the Commission adopted the recommendations from the Administrative Law Judge and ordered the following:

1. That Cementon's complaint is hereby Dismissed.
2. Cementon and PAG are ordered and directed to each pay one-half of the PUC's regulatory fees and expenses, including and without limitation, consulting and counsel fees, and the fees and expenses associated with the instant proceedings.

## **PUC Meeting on PAG Docket 17-02, Review of Updated Lease Rates**

On Monday, September 18, 2017, the Port received notice from the PUC concerning the upcoming Business for the Public Utilities Commission hearing scheduled for Thursday, September 28, 2017 on PAG Docket 17-02, Review of Updated Lease Rates, ALJ Report and Proposed Order. Port management and staff will be in attendance at this hearing and will provide the Board an update on the PUC decision on this matter.

## **Meeting with MARAD Officials on TIGER Grant**

On Thursday, September 14, 2017, the GM, Deputy GM for Operations Felix Pangelinan, and Deputy GM for Administration and Finance Alfred Duenas met with officials from MARAD that were here to meet with Port management and staff to discuss issues related to the implementation of TIGER to refurbish H-Wharf. Attending on behalf of MARAD were: Grant Specialist Jeff Baldwinsson, Grant Supervisor David Bohnet, Engineer Gustavo Vecino, and Environmental Protection Specialist Kris Gilson. Also present on behalf of the Port were



Operations Manager John Santos, Planner IV Joe Javellana, Planner IV Donna Lizama-Acosta and Program Coordinator JoyJean Arceo.

The subject matters that were discussed on the agenda included an overview of the H-wharf project, updates on the grant documents to include the NEPA Evaluation and the scope, schedule, budget and performance timelines, outline of applicable laws and regulations and review of initial site visit checklist. Grant Specialist Baldwinsson relayed that he would be forwarding binder documents that would include reporting requirements for quarterly reports to include financial and reimbursement reports. These documents were since forwarded to the GM on Thursday, September 21, 2017.

The GM and Deputy GM Pangelinan then provided a tour of H-Wharf as well as a tour of the Yard to the MARAD representatives upon the conclusion of the formal meeting.

The Planning Division will take the lead in coordinating responses with MARAD as the H-Wharf project moves forward. The GM will facilitate the requirements related to a Cooperative Agreement related to the repairs needed in the expanded Yard and the transfer of remaining funds to purchase additional top lifters as previously agreed with the MARAD Administrator.

## **Port Security Grant Award for 2017**

The Port of Guam received notice from FEMA on Friday, September 1, 2017, that it was awarded \$620,269.00 in this year's Port Security Grant Program which based on the cost share of 75% federal and 25% Port share combined total \$827,025.00, the 2017 projects are now fully funded. These projects include:

Project 1: Refurbishment and Hardening of Load Center Buildings Housing Prime Power Generators is fully funded for \$384,469.

Project 2: Maintenance and Sustainment Contract for Prime Power Generators is fully funded for \$179,550.

Project 3: US Coast Guard Endorsed Multi-Agency National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (NASBLA) Training is fully funded for \$56,250.

Congratulations to the Planning Division and Port staff that contributed to the success of the Port's 2017 PSGP application!

## **PUGG Meeting for August**

The PUGG Meeting for the month of August was held on Thursday, August 17, 2017. Attending on behalf of the Port were the GM, Deputy GM for Operations Felix Pangelinan, Operations Manager John Santos, Maintenance Manager Ernie Candoleta, Equipment Maintenance Superintendent Jorge Javelosa, Stevedore Superintendent Simon Pinaula, Chief Planner Dot Harris, Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle, Terminal Superintendent Joe Ulloa, and Planner Worker Coordinator Rhroda Casupang.

Present on behalf of the PUGG were Ambyth Representatives Andrew Miller and Yvonne San Nicolas, Seabridge Representative Ricardo Leon Guerrero, Matson Representatives Bernie Valencia and Tom Dillon, MELL Representative Ed Cruz and Cabras Representative Joe Cruz.

Present on behalf of Guam Customs and Quarantine was Customs Officer III Maybellene Muna.

Present on behalf of the U.S. Coast Guard was LCDR Christy Casey and Marine Science Tech Chief Todd Wheeler.

Operations Manager Santos began the meeting by updating the PUGG on issues that had been raised by the carriers concerning information sent out from the TOS after vessel a was loaded that did not match their stowage plan. He stated that Terminal Superintendent Joe Ulloa would be working with IT to address this issue. Operations Manager Santos also provided an update on

the Yard Stripping and Lightening projects and stated that the two projects were 90% completed at this time.

Operations Manager Santos went on to discuss the security requirement issues in the Federated States of Micronesia that were being regulated by the U.S. Coast Guard and stated that the Coast Guard will be informing the carriers when they will start to enforce security measures on vessels calling from the FSM Ports. Ambyth Representative Miller inquired as to why truckers that have already taken the MARSEC level training with Port Police is required to take the same training again if they are hired by another trucking company? Deputy GM Pangelinan responded that they should not have to retake the training as long as there is evidence that training has already been obtained. He stated that he would further discuss this matter with Police Chief Agüero.

Operations Manager Santos relayed that a draft had been handed out to the agents for review and comments related to the Terminal Shuttle Service. He stated that only one company has provided feedback on the issue so far.

Matson Representative Dillion inquired as to the status of repairs to the F-1 Dolphin Fender so that he could inform the captains of his vessels to call that pier. Deputy GM Pangelinan responded that he will get a status update and provide a response to the group.

Operations Manager Santos provided an update on the Mobile Harbor Crane and stated that the boom counter weight and head block were recently removed during the First Phase and that the Second Phase would include the dismantling of the tower for total removal from the Yard. As for other Yard equipment, Operations Manager Santos reported that the newly acquired 20-Ton and three 10-Tons had recently arrived on island and were waiting servicing and turnover from the vendor. The GM added that this additional equipment was funded out of the Port's 2017 operational budget and was procured to replace existing equipment as needed.

Operations Manager Santos went on to state that the Port was providing on the job training for the Crane Operators and that the employees had completed their required 40-hour training.

Operations Manager Santos also informed the PUGG that there would be an upcoming public hearing on Bill No. 157-34 that was introduced by the Port's Legislative Chairman Frank Aguon to approve bond financing to address several major projects to include funding the Port's share for the TIGER grant to renovate H-Wharf, replacement and relocation of the Port's Administration Building, repairs to the waterlines in the old Yard, and repairs to the Warehouse 1 and the EQMR Building. He stated that the Port is still awaiting notice on the scheduled hearing date and would relay the information to the carriers and agents once received.

Operations Manager Santos also noted that representatives from MARAD would be on-island, Thursday, September 14, 2017 to tour H-Wharf and the Port's facilities. He inquired if there

were any further issues or concerns to be discussed? There being none, he concluded the meeting.

## **PUGG Meeting for September**

The PUGG Meeting for the month of September was held on Thursday, September 22, 2017. Attending on behalf of the Port were the GM, Acting Deputy GM for Operations and Operations Manager John Santos, Maintenance Manager Ernie Candoleta, Transportation Superintendent Ray Santos, Stevedore Superintendent Simon Pinault and Terminal Superintendent Joe Ulloa.

Present on behalf of the PUGG were Ambyth Representative Yvonne Sannicolas and APL Representative Ray Hartley.

Present on behalf of Guam Customs and Quarantine were Captain David Taitano and Customs Officer III Maybellene Muna.

Present on behalf of the U.S. Coast Guard was LCDR Christy Casey.

Operations Manager John Santos opened the meeting by discussing a question that was raised during the previous PUGG meeting that was held on Thursday, August 17, 2017 concerning requirements for Maritime Security (MARSEC) Level training. Ambyth Representative Andrew Miller had made an inquiry concerning truckers that had taken MARSEC training while working for a previous company and were now hired with another company. He wanted to know if their training certification was still valid. Manager Santos stated that the Port has determined that if a trucker has already received the MARSEC training, he or she would not be required to retake the course even if they may have transferred to work for another trucking company.

Operations Manager Santos went on to inform the PUGG that there were currently thirteen (13) Port personnel that were retiring this month that this was already affecting the composition of one gang for operations to include cargo checkers and transportation personnel. He stated that some of these employees are well known to the carriers and that there will be a new orientation period for new employees that will be filling these positions. He also noted that there have also been changes in key employees representing the carriers so there will be an orientation period for both the carriers, agents and the Port.

Operations Manager Santos provided an update on the status of the new forklifts that were procured by the Port and stated that there were some issues related to specifications on the equipment that the Port had concerns with that was being worked on with the vendor. He added that there are currently enough 20-Ton and 10-Tons to support ongoing operations. In addition, he relayed that the Port was also awaiting the arrival of additional 5-Ton forklifts.

Operations Manager Santos also reported that Gantry No. 6 went down on Monday and has since been repaired turned back to service on Wednesday afternoon. He stated that there was still further maintenance work that would be ongoing for this gantry.

Operations Manager Santos inquired if APL and Ambyth had any issues with regard to the TOS implementation? The carriers responded there were no issues at this time.

Operations Manager Santos went on to discuss the recent Strategic Ports meeting that he attended with the GM and relayed that the biggest concern was focused on Cyber Security. He stated that this is an area that the Port is working to address its response to cyber threats and relayed that a significant example of this was the recent infiltration to the Maersk Shipping Line that is currently the largest container shipping company in the world. He added that this is a real issue that we all need to be concerned about especially now that hackers can cause such havoc to vessels on the seas and infiltrate data information of shipping companies and ports.

Operations Manager Santos relayed that Matson had recently announced that they are servicing out of Okinawa. He then inquired of APL Representative Harley if the Vessel APL Saipan would be calling the Guam Port on Sunday. Representative Hartley responded affirmatively. Manager Santos went on to thank APL for their support recent testimony during the legislative hearing on Tuesday for the Port's bond bill.

The GM also thanked APL for their testimony during the hearing and relayed that she was hoping that other carriers that considered the proposed upgrades and repairs that would be funded by the bond bill would also provide testimony. She went on to discuss the critical importance of these projects and that if they were not addressed would eventually effect the operations in an adverse way and ultimately affect the carriers. The GM stated that this was the first time that the Port was pursuing bond financing and that timing was critical to insure that these projects be approved to move forward. Otherwise, she did not know if this initiative would be further pursued after next year.

LCDR Casey inquired if there were any issues that the Port or the carriers had with regards to the Safety Zones that were imposed during September 18-19, 2017. The group responded that they had no issues with the Safety Zones related to the training. LCDR Casey stated that the Coast Guard would be holding an industry event for owners and operators around October 30, 2017 and that more details will be forthcoming. She then inquired about the status of the Yard stripping project. Operations Manager Santos responded that most of the Yard has been completed except for areas at the wing tip of the water front that will be addressed during dry weather. LCDR Casey relayed that she found attending the Pre-Operations meeting to be helpful with regards to the information provided and inquired if she could assign a representative from



the USCG to attend future meetings to also update and respond to questions as needed. Operations Manager Santos responded that he welcomed the USCG participation.

Captain David Taitano informed the group that with regards to entry matters, Guam Customs will not process vessels not listed as coming into Guam. This is to include foreign and transiting vessels. He also discussed concerns related to seal numbers on the containers that are different from the document number. He stated that any changes to the seal numbers should have concurrent documentation to match and if it does not match, there should be a very good explanation.

Operations Manager Santos responded that a separate meeting could be called to further address this matter with the carriers and meet with a focus on this particular subject. Captain Taitano stated that his division is understaffed but there still remains a need to insure the proper seals on the containers. He stated that in the case of fuel, Customs provides a preclearance for tankers but Bills of Laden are also required. Otherwise fuel cannot be transferred off the vessel.

Without further matters to discuss, Operations Manager Santos concluded the meeting.

### **Inchcape Shipping Services (Guam) LLC Office Closure**

On Monday, August 28, 2017, the Port received notice General Manager Ariel R. Dumapit that Inchcape Shipping Services (Guam) LLC that the company was closing its offices in Guam and Saipan and had filed a Statement of Intent to Dissolve with the Guam Department of Revenue and Taxation scheduled for Saturday, September 30, 2017.

GM Dumapit also relayed that effective Friday, September 1, 2017 that Ambyth Shipping & Trading Guam and Ambyth Shipping Micronesia will handle all of the ISS' vessels in the CNMI and FSM. He extended his appreciation to the partnership and support that the Port has provided over the years.

### **Fishing Enforcement at the Gregorio D. Perez Marina**

On Friday, August 18, 2017, the Port Authority issued a press release to provide public notice that the Port Authority would be enforcing an existing law and the Port's Marina Rules and Regulations at the marina.

The GM had met with the Director of the Department of Agriculture Matthew Sablan on Thursday, August 17, 2017 at the marina to discuss the ongoing issues with regards to current fishing practices at the marina. As a result of the meeting, the Port moved forward in coordination with the Department of Agriculture to address enforcement of existing law under 5 GCA Chapter 63, §63116 that limit fishing practices to angling and cast net fishing commonly

known as Talåya as the only two approved fishing methods that are permissible within the marina proper.

Back in August of 2012, in response to ongoing conflict between angler and net fishermen at the Marina previous Port management had proposed an initiative to enable seasonal net fishing within the Marina Boat Basin that it interpreted at the time may have been allowed under 5 GCA Chapter 63, §63116. The Port was also aware at that time that this proposal was in conflict with the Port's own regulations governing the marina but took the position that the Port rules could not limit the authority of the Department of Agriculture to regulate fishing activity under its jurisdiction.

The Port recommended a designated net fishing area in the outer basin that it interpreted at the time may have been allowed under existing law. In August of 2013, the Department of Agriculture concurred with the Port's designation and approved net fishing practices within the "Outer Basin" of the Marina.

Upon further review of this matter GM Brown has not found any further information that the Port's proposal, concurred by the Department of Agriculture, was ever proposed to the Guam Legislature and formulated into law.

On Thursday, August 24, 2017, Director Sablan provided a written response to the GM that the Guam Department of Agriculture was in concurrence with the Port's decision . . ."and in lieu of any statute, the cessation of fishing via any other method besides Talaya or Tod-n-Reel, will be prohibited."

On Tuesday morning, August 29, 2017, Port Police responded to a complaint of net fishing in the marina's outer basin. The responsible party was provided notice that they would have one hour to remove their net or face enforcement action. The party complied and the net was removed without incident.

### **Christening Ceremony for the Cabras Marine M.T. Agility**

On Wednesday, 23, 2017 a ceremony was held by Cabras Marine Corporation for the Christening of its new tugboat the M.T. Agility. Attending the ceremony on behalf of the Port were Board Chairman Francisco Santos, GM and Deputy GM for Operations Felix Pangelinan. The GM provided remarks on behalf of the Port to congratulate Cabras Marine on its new tug acquisition.



The M.T. Agility is 86.2 feet in length with a breadth of 32.2 feet and a depth of 14.4 feet and has a bollard pull of 50 tons. The M.T. Agility is assigned to Guam with a second new Cabras tug called the Matua that has been assigned to Saipan.

### **Matson Celebrates Grand Opening of New Building**

On Thursday, August 31, 2017, Matson celebrating the Grand Opening of its new office located at Adelup. The cost for the new building to include the acquisition of the land, construction of the building and office furnishings totaled \$6.3 million and was completed earlier this year on June 15, 2017. The office consists of a total of 10,000 sq. ft.

Attending the ceremony on behalf of the Port were Board Member Maria Taitano, GM, and Deputy GM for Operations Felix Pangelinan. Congratulations for Matson on the completion of its new building!

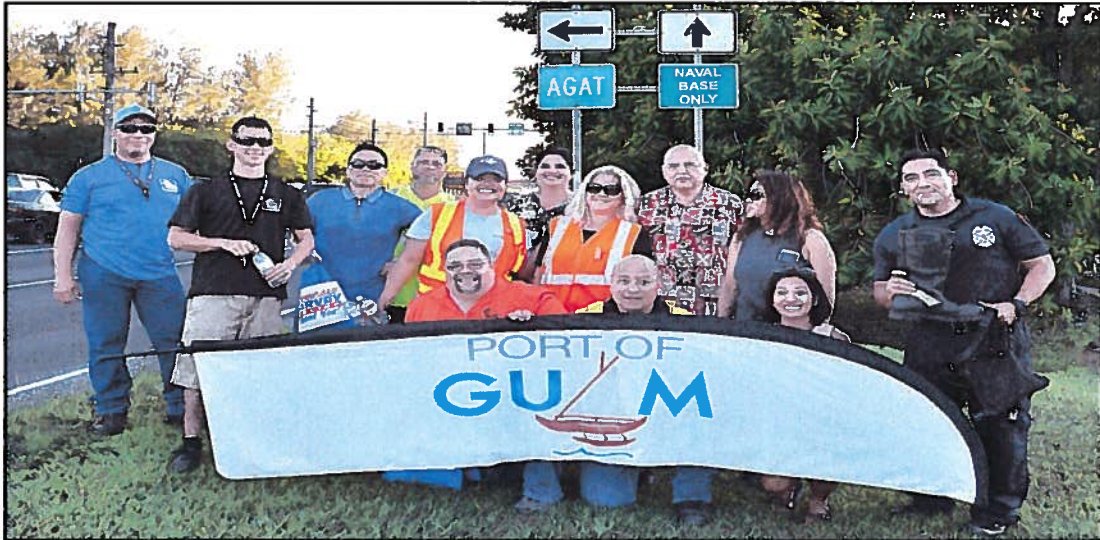

She also provided information on the Port's 5-year Tariff that was approved by the PUC earlier this year and implemented on June 1, 2017.

## **Port Safety Issues**

### **Property Damage – T-97 Air Line Breakaway Case No. 75-17**

On Wednesday, August 23, 2017, the GM received a report from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning an incident that occurred on Friday, August 18, 2017 concerning damage to the Air Line Breakaway for Tractor No. 97. According to Administrator Acfalle Safety Inspector Kenneth Santos had received a call from Port Police Officer II Angie Cabrera to report that there was damage to Tractor No. 97 that had been operated by Operator II Danny Zamora who had been assigned to the Vessel APL operation. Operator II Zamora stated that he was operating Tractor No. 97 and relayed that he had dropped off a 20-foot chassis into a parking

stall at Area 1. He further stated that as he pulled away from the parking stall he thought that he had disconnected the air lines from the chassis. However the air lines stretched out causing the breakaway nipples to snap off from the rear of the tractor resulting in damage to the breakaway nipples and no damage to the air hoses.

Port Police officer Angie Cabrera and Safety Inspector Santos responded to this incident.

Administrator Acfalle reported that Equipment Mechanic II Richard Flores indicated that the inch break away plastic fitting mounted to the tractor broke off due to the air hoses being stretched out. He also reported that plastic break away fitting is a safety device on the tractors to break off under certain stress levels and is used as a precautionary measure when the glad hand is still engaged or when the service lines are stretched out. Administrator Acfalle also reported that the cost to replace the breakaway nipple in is around \$120.00 each.

Administrator Acfalle concluded that the primary cause of this incident was due to Equipment Operator II Zamora's failure to follow proper procedures.

Administrator Acfalle recommend that this matter be discussed by the Accident Review Board and to then forward their findings to the GM for appropriate action.

## **Damaged Property**

### **Case No. 76-17**

On Wednesday, August 23, 2017, the GM received a report from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning a damaged chassis. Safety Administrator Acfalle reported that Safety Inspector III Paul Salas had received a call from Cargo Checker Supervisor Joseph Tajalle reporting damaged property at F-5. Equipment Operator II Kevin Cruz had been operating Tractor No.102 and was assigned to Vessel Matson Maunawili operation. He stated he had drayed a 45-foot chassis from Area "H" to dockside to retrieve another container that was being discharged by Gantry No. 5. Operator II Cruz stated after Gantry No. 5 Operator David Roberto had discharged a loaded 40-foot flat rack with a Sky Track Forklift weighing around 16.5 tons onto his chassis, he then looked at the front of his load and noticed that the goose neck on his chassis was bent. There was damage to the chassis. He immediately contacted Transportation Supervisor Anthony Concepcion and informed him of the incident.

Port Police Officer II Eric Salas and Safety Inspector II Salas responded to the incident.

Safety Administrator Acfalle determined in his findings that the flat racks cross beam which is used to support the load was cut off. He added that there was also a 4-inch dent on both sides of the front chassis in the goose neck area and no damage to the flat rack.

Safety Administrator Acfalle concluded that the cause of this incident was due to a defective flat rack. He recommended that this incident be forwarded to the Accident Review Board to provide its review and recommendations to the General Manager for appropriate action.

### **Property Damage Gantry No. 5 Case No. 77-17**

On Wednesday, September 6, 2017, the GM received a report from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning a report that was dated Tuesday, August 29, 2017 on an incident that occurred on Monday, August 28, 2017. According to Safety Administrator Acfalle, Detailed Safety Inspector Robert Lau had received a call from Transportation Leader Kin Meno to investigate property damage to the spreader on Gantry No. 5. Crane Operator Jesse Diego had stated that he had just completed loading a 20-foot container onto the Vessel Kyowa Cattleya's Bay No. 4 and while he was hoisting up, the vessel began to rock causing the spreader to sway forward hitting the underside of the deck. There was damage to the right side flapper (waterside) of the gantry spreader.

Port Police Officer II James Sandlin and Safety Inspector Lau responded to this incident.

Safety Administrator Acfalle determined in his findings that the vessel was rocking at the time of the incident and that the spreaders right flapper was bent on the top of the mounting bracket. Fortunately there was no damage to the Bay No. 4 car deck.

Equipment Support Service Mechanic Manager estimated the cost of the damaged flapper between \$150.00 to \$200.00.

Safety Administrator Acfalle concluded that due to the rocking motion of the vessel, the gantry spreader's flapper hit the underside of Bay No. 4 damaging the flapper. He recommended that this incident be forwarded to the Accident Review Board to provide its review and recommendations to the General Manager for appropriate action.

### **Hydraulic Oil Spill Top Lifter No. 16-07 Case No. 78-17**

On Wednesday, September 6, 2017, the GM received a report from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning a hydraulic oil spill incident that occurred on Tuesday September 5, 2017. According to Safety Administrator Acfalle, he was informed by Acting Transportation Supervisor Joseph Leon Guerrero of a hydraulic oil spill between Areas N and O in the Yard. Equipment Operator III Theodore Cruz had been assigned to operate Top Loader 09-06 in support of daily issuing and receiving of containers. He was loading a 40-foot container onto a 40-foot chassis at Area N when he noticed smoke coming out from under his equipment.



Equipment Operator IIII Cruz then immediately shut down his equipment and notified Acting Transportation Supervisor Joseph Leon Guerrero.

Mechanic II Richard Flores, Port Police II Keesha Duenas and Safety Administrator Acfalle responded to this incident.

Safety Administrator Acfalle determined in his findings that Mechanic II Flores indicated that the hydraulic hose line leading to the steering gear busted due to wear and tear. He estimated that approximately one (1) gallon of hydraulic oil had spilled onto the pavement and relayed that Transportation personnel had utilized absorbent sand and absorbent pads to clean-up the oil spill. Safety Administrator Acfalle also relayed that the National Response Center was notified and that Report No.1189349 was issued.

Safety Administrator Acfalle concluded that the primary cause of this incident was due to defective hydraulic hose. He recommended that this incident be forwarded to the Accident Review Board to provide its review and recommendations to the General Manager for appropriate action.

## **Injured Person**

### **Case No. 79-17**

On September 19, 2017, the GM received a report from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning an incident that occurred on September 14, 2017. Safety Administrator Acfalle stated that Security Guard Gerard Duenas had sustained an on the job injury when he bumped his left knee on the hallway wall while walking back to the Dispatch area in the Port Police Office.

Safety Administrator Acfalle relayed that Security Guard Duenas was assigned as a dispatcher in the Port Police Office and had been walking to the rear of the office to retrieve his pens and a binder in a locker when the incident occurred. Security Guard Duenas stated that he was looking down at his portable radio and did not notice that he was so close to the hallway wall. Security Guard Duenas reported pain to his left knee and was provided with WCC Form 101a/b sent to GMH for appropriate medical attention. His Supervisor, Lt. Jesse Flores was provided with WCC 201 and 202 Forms to complete and return to the Safety Office.

Safety Administrator Acfalle determined that the hallway in the Police Office was partially blocked by employees lockers with a 2-foot clear to walk through.

Safety Administrator Acfalle concluded that the primary cause of this incident was due to inattention on the part of Security Guard Duenas to his footing and his haste. Administrator Acfalle also advised Lt. Flores to remove the lockers in the hallway. He added that Security

Guard Duenas also be consulted on the proper postponing and to take extra precautionary measures when walking.

Safety Administrator Acfalle recommended that this matter be forward to the Accident Review Committee and to then provide their recommendations to the GM for appropriate action.

## **Injured Person**

### **Case No. 80-17**

On September 19, 2017, the GM received a report from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning an incident that occurred that day involving personal injury to Casual Stevedore Jesus San Nicolas. Safety Administrator Acfalle reported that Safety Inspector III Paul Salas had been contacted by Stevedore Supervisor1 Reed Topasna concerning the incident. Casual Stevedore San Nicolas had been assigned to the Vessel Matson Manulani and was releasing and unlocking the chains and the binders when the binder level released and awkwardly forced the lever to hit him on his right knee.

Safety Administrator Acfalle determined in his findings that when the container was lashed at the point of origin, the chain and binder level was twisted inward towards the container. When Stevedore San Nicolas released the pressure of the chain and binder, the chain unraveled with such force that Stevedore San Nicolas lost his hold of the lever which hit him in the right knee. He complained of pain in his right knee as a result of the incident and was provided with the WCC Forms 101a/b and sent to GMH for further medical attention. Stevedore Supervisor Topasna was also issued WCC Forms 201 and 202 for him to complete and then return to the Safety Office.

Safety Administrator Acfalle concluded that the cause of this incident was the incorrect lashing and positioning of the chain and binder at the point of origin. He recommended that an Activity Hazard Analysis of unlashings operations be briefed at the next Stevedoring Safety Briefing. He also recommended that that this matter be forward to the Accident Review Committee and to then provide their recommendations to the GM for appropriate action.

## **Property Damage to Tractor No. 97**

### **Case No. 81-17**

On Wednesday, September 20, 2017, the GM received a report from Safety Administrator Vince Acfalle concerning damage to Tractor No. 97 that had occurred that day. According to Safety Administrator Acfalle, Safety Inspector II Kenneth Santos had received a call from Transportation Leader Anthony Concepcion to report property damage to Tractor No. 97 that had been driven by Equipment Operator II David Teixeira and was assigned to the Vessel Manulani

operation. According to Equipment Operator II Teixeira, he stated that he had dropped off a 40-foot chassis into the parking stall at Area W and that as he pulled away he thought he had disconnected the air lines from the chassis. However the air line stretched out causing the breakaway nipples to snap off from the rear of the tractor resulting to damage to breakaway nipples and no damage to the air hoses.

Port Police Officer II Mr. James Sandlin and Safety Inspector II Santos responded to this incident.

Safety Administrator Acfalle determined in his findings that Equipment Mechanic Richard Flores indicated that the half inch breakaway plastic fitting mounted to the tractor broke off due to the air hoses being stretched out. The plastic breakaway fitting is a safety device designed to break off under certain stress levels and used as a precautionary measure when glad hand are still engaged or when service lines are stretched out. The replacement cost for the breakaway nipple is \$120.00 each.

Safety Administrator Acfalle determined that the primary cause of the incident was Equipment Operator II Teixeira failure to follow proper procedures. He recommended that this incident be forwarded to the Accident Review Board to provide its review and recommendations to the General Manager for appropriate action.

3. Copy of invoices submitted to the Port Authority of Guam by the legal (office) of Phillips and Bordallo for the Year 2016.

On Wednesday, August 23, 2017, Mr. Leon Guerrero was informed that due to the breath of his request, the Port would provide the information by Friday, August 25, 2017.

On Friday, August 25, 2017 Mr. Leon Guerrero was provided the information he requested from the Port.

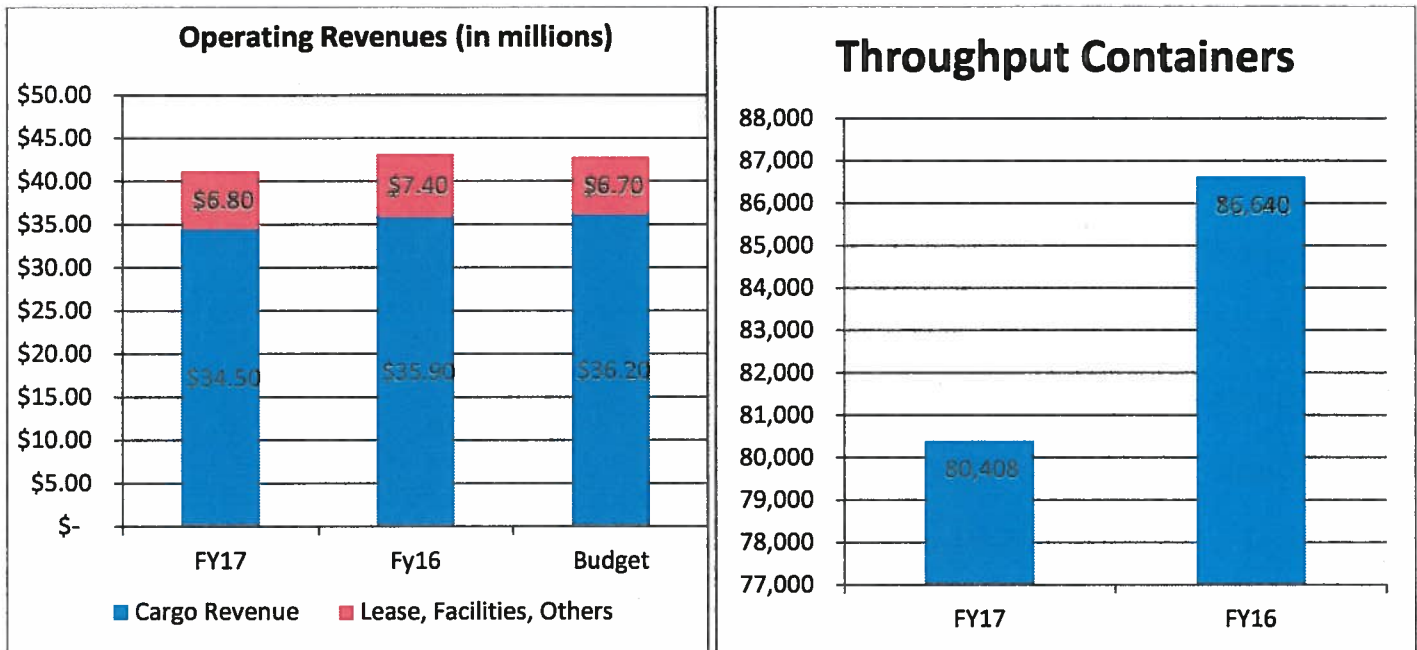

## **Financial Highlights – YTD July FY2017**

### **Operating Performance:**



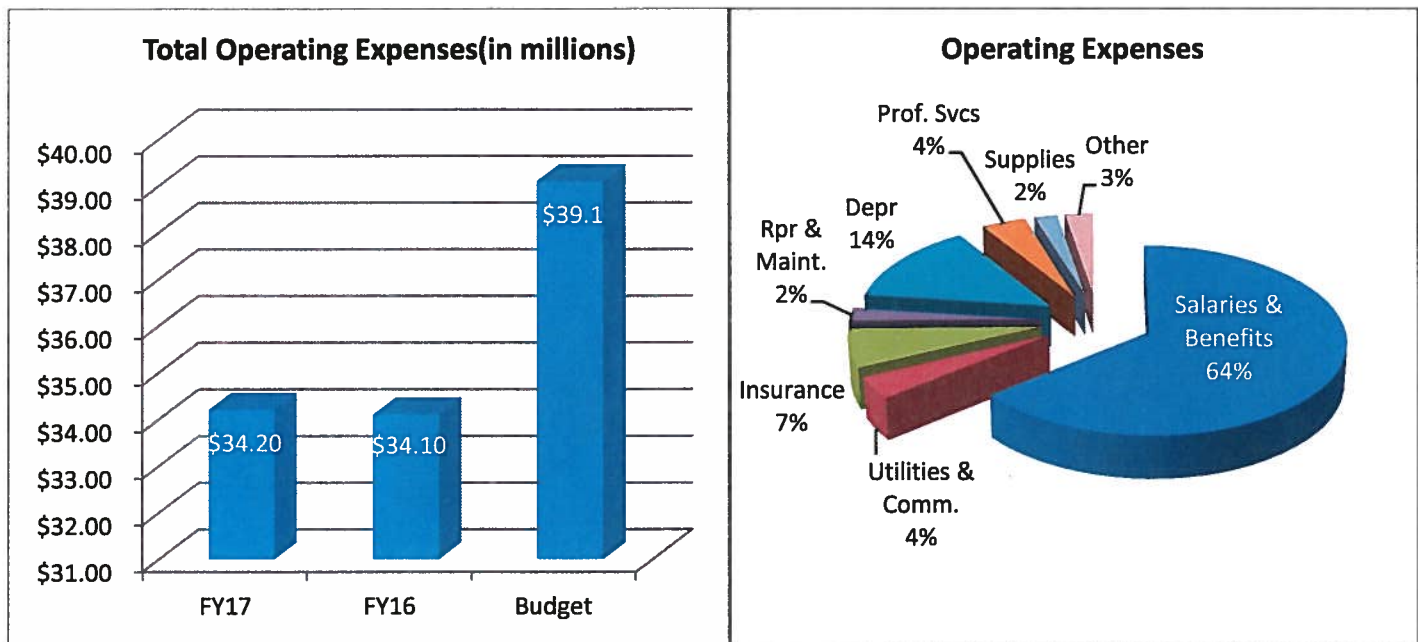
Total Operating Revenues as of July 2017 was \$41.3 million, which consist of \$34.5 million in cargo revenues and \$6.8 million in Facilities, Leases, and Other Services.

FY17 YTD cargo revenue is 4% lower than last year's total (\$35.9 mil) and 5% lower than Budget (\$36.2 mil).

FY17 YTD Facilities, Leases, and Other Services as of July is 9% lower than last year (\$7.4 mil) and 1% higher than budget (\$6.7 mil).

Overall Operating Revenues as of July is 4% lower than Budget (\$42.9 mil) and 5% lower than last year's year to date July (\$43.3 mil).

Total number of containers handled as of July 2017 was 80,408 which is 7% lower compared to last year July total 86,640.



Total Operating Expenses as of July 2017 was \$34.2 million, which is 13% lower than Budget (\$39.1 mil) and less than 1% higher than last year's total operating expenses (\$34.1 mil).

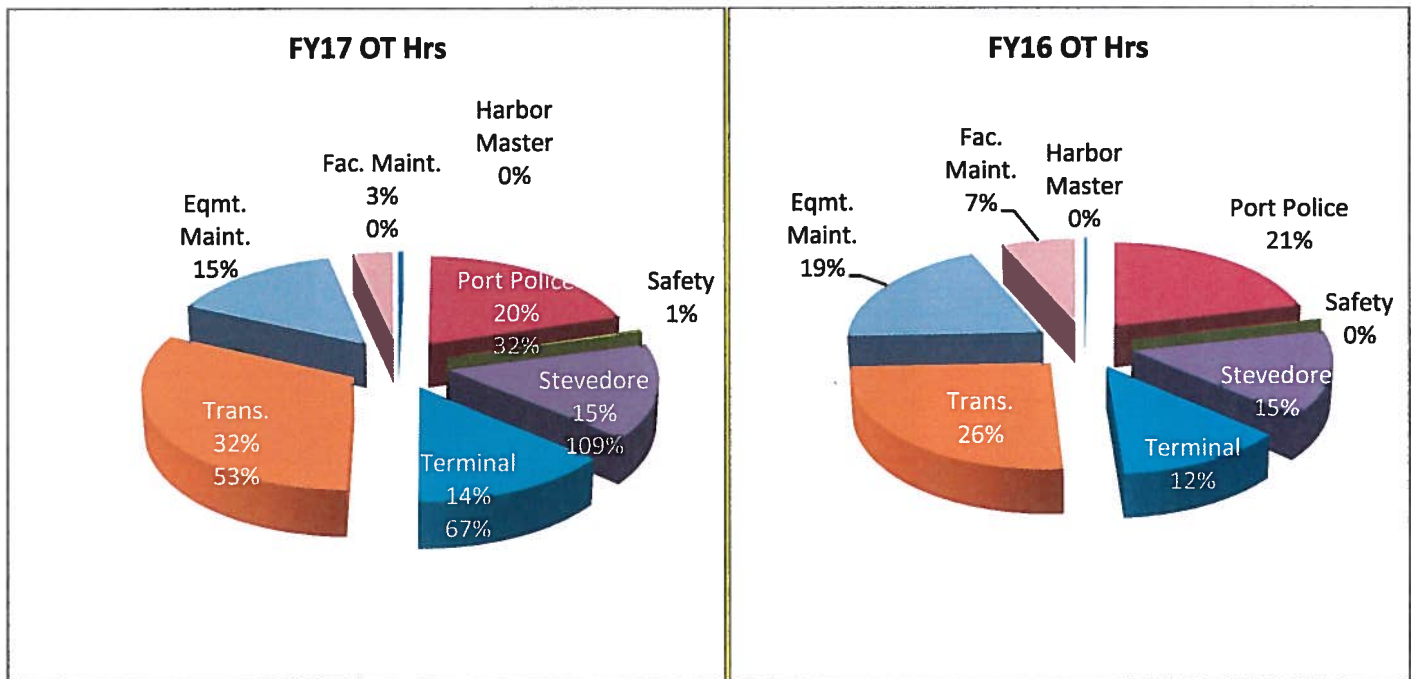
Total Overtime as of July 2017 was \$1.4 million which is 3% higher than last year July (\$1.3 million). Direct Labor Revenue as of July was \$2.7 million, which is 1% higher than last year and 1% lower than budget. Direct Labor charges are for services performed by Port employees under special service request and differentials under the throughput.

Year to date Operating Revenues minus the Year to date Operating Expenses resulted to an Operating Income of \$7.1 million as of July 31, 2017.

Non Operating Revenues and Expenses consist of the following: \$2.6 million-Retirement contribution for COLA, Supplemental and Medical/Dental/Life Insurance expenses, \$930 thousand-Interest expense on loans and \$45k Interest Income. The net total of non operating expenses and revenues as of July is a negative \$3.5 million.

The Total Net Income as of July is \$3.6 million.

**Accounts Receivable Trade (net)** as of July 31, 2017 is \$5.3 million.

Aging Status is a follows: 70% - Current, 8% - over 30 days, 3% - over 60 days, 1% - over 90 days and 18% - over 120 days.
